This Washington state golf course is home to the 2015 U.S. Open and 2010 U.S. Amateur Championships and is conveniently located just outside of Tacoma, in Pierce County. Less than an hour's drive South from Seattle, this 18-hole championship golf course provides a traditional, links-style layout featuring impressive emerald greens, dazzling fairways, and brilliant tees. The overall views are just as spectacular as your soul escapes into the history of the game. Like those old courses, Chambers Bay is walking only.





















A World-Renowned Coastal Georgia Golf Resort

Rated No. 1 in the U.S. among the "World's 50 Best Golf Hotels" by *Golf Digest Index*, Sea Island features two 18-hole championship courses. Sea Island's devotion to golf spans 80 years – a history that encompasses such luminaries of the game as Bobby Jones, Walter Travis, Harry S. Colt, and Davis Love III. It all combines to create world-class play in an unparalleled setting.

Guests can become part of a time-honored tradition at Sea Island Resorts at either of the two championship Georgia golf courses. Tee off on the Seaside Course -- updated in 1999 by Tom Fazio and prominently placed on *Golf Digest's* list of "Top 100 Courses in the United States." The Plantation Course unfolds among a forest of ancient live oak and cedar, with a hint of danger lurking in its tidal creeks and lakes.



The Seaside Course was originally designed in 1929 by famed architects **Harry S. Colt** and **Charles Alison** and underwent an update in 1999 by **Tom Fazio** -- earning it a prominent place on *Golf Digest's* list of "Top 100 Courses in the United States." Situated at the southern tip of St. Simons Island, this luxury golf travel destination places a premium on careful shot selection, recovery, and putting. Offering Sea Island's most demanding layout, Seaside has hosted multiple USGA events, challenging golf's best amateur players. Seaside will serve as the host venue for the PGA TOU R's McGladrey Classic October 7-10, 2010.












Plantation Course

The Plantation Course boasts expansive fairways that give definition to this parklands-type course, winding through the marsh and forest. The course showcases beautiful views of the ocean, oaks, and blooming flowers – enticing the accomplished and inviting the novice.

With Rees Jones's masterful renovation in 1998 of this Walter Travis original, the Plantation Course unfolds among a forest of ancient live oak and cedar, with a hint of danger lurking in its tidal creeks and lakes. Players appreciate the stunning Atlantic Ocean views that make Plantation one of the best South golf courses.






















We-Ko-Pa Golf Club is a daily fee golf facility that consists of the original 18 holes, the Cholla Course, designed by Scott Miller and a second 18 holes, the Saguaro Course, designed by **Bill**Coore and Ben Crenshaw, which opened Saturday, December 16, 2006. In addition to the two 18-hole courses, there is a large practice facility and a full-service clubhouse. We-Ko-Pa Golf Club has been developed and is owned by the Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation.

Located just east of Scottsdale and
Fountain Hills, the course is located
on land that will never be used for
residential or commercial development,
yielding dramatic views of the Sonoran desert
and the surrounding mountains.



The Saguaro Course at We-Ko-Pa Golf Club is a desert golf experience unlike any other. Integrating design elements not commonly found in the desert, the course is built for walking and has more in common with older, more traditional courses where greens are close to tees and the course follows the natural movement of the land

"This piece of land has some very interesting natural movement to it," said Crenshaw of the new We-Ko-Pa course. "I think this golf course will be pretty unique for the desert. People will be induced to play different shots and find solutions to new challenges when playing this course."

Saguaro has already been featured in numerous golf publications including Golfweek, which currently ranks it as the #1 public access course in Arizona. In addition, GOLF magazine named it one of the "Top 10 Best New Courses You Can Play" in the United States 2007.











LuLu Country Club - North Hills, PA

"The Smoothest Rolling Greens in Philadelphia"

A farm bordered by Limekiln Pike and Jenkintown Road was the birthplace of the LuLu Country Club. George S. Cox owned the farm, and during the first decade of the new century he would invite his fellow Shriners from LuLu Temple, together with their families, to join him there for picnics on weekends. In 1909 the golfing Shriners rented the farm from George Cox in order to build a nine-hole golf course. No amateur golf architect for them—no, indeed. Nothing would do but that they bring in the best—and best-known—course designer in America, Donald Ross. Ross, who was born in Dornoch, Scotland, and had learned the craft of course design there and at St. Andrews, had established his reputation on the strength of his outstanding layouts at Pinehurst, North Carolina. Now he was broadening his horizons, and LuLu Temple was among his earliest efforts outside Pinehurst. It was also his first course in Pennsylvania. A charter was granted by the commonwealth in the name of LuLu Temple Country Club in 1912. Six years later the club acquired another parcel of land, on which the present clubhouse is located. Donald Ross was again called in, this time to build an 18-hole course. There were few trees on this expanse of rolling farmland, so he used a number of bunkers, together with cunningly sloping and shaped green surrounds, to challenge the player. As trees were planted and grew to maturity over the years, some of the hazards were revised or removed. But the holes today are essentially those designed by Donald Ross almost exactly 80 years ago, the basic routing plan remains unchanged, and LuLu continues to be what it has always been, a course of charm and character and variety, a course that we never weary of playing.












Meadowlands was established in 1949 and was built on open and very gently rolling land, where cattle and horses had grazed for years. The initial layout proved less interesting and challenging than the board and the golf committee had expected. So within a few years of opening, **Bill** and **Dave Gordon** were called in. They developed a master plan to be implemented as funds permitted. They also made extensive revisions at that time to the original scheme. The result was a much more varied eighteen characterized by narrow fairways (average width 25 yards), enhanced shot values, and greater aesthetic appeal.

Over time, thousands of $tr_{i\bar{o}}$ es were planted in order to give better definition to the holes, and good use was made of the USGA Greens Section and the agronomy experts from Penn State in order to improve the condition of the turf.

In the mid-90s the Maryland-based firm of **Ault, Clark and Associates** would be brought in to make extensive changes to the Gordon layout. Seven new holes would be created then, a number of others would be revised (with broader fairways an important result), trees would be removed, and water would be brought into play as the par-71 Meadowlands course became a more contemporary and stimulating test of golf.

BALLAMOR GOLF CLUB

In 2010, the gates opened at the area's best maintained, most spectacular course – one that was formally limited to a small number of enthusiasts.

Carefully carved out of gently rolling land and dense woods, Ballamor was named one of New Jersey's Best Private Courses by NJ Golf Magazine. Designed by nationally renowned architects **Ault**, **Clark & Associates** the course uniquely blends traditional architecture with subtle modern-day nuances succinctly capturing the distinct beauty of the property. As such, each hole possesses its own individual character with a total package that presents a strong composition, testing every type of golf shot.

This once private course is now open to the public so all area golfers can now experience this uniquely wooded southern New Jersey daily fee golf club.

"The layout is incredible," said Mike Tucci, general manager and head pro at Ballamor. "There's a lot of natural roll to the property."

"The fairways are generous, the greens are large and undulating. They're so large you want to be in an area where you're not putting over a hump. And the conditions are impeccable, with bent grass tees, fairways and greens."

The par-72 layout measures 7,098 yards from the tips and is spread over 340 acres.

Tucci likes the idea that the holes are clustered in what he called "pods."

"You play the first hole, cross a bridge and play holes 2 through 5," he said. "Then there a bridge to the sixth hole, and a bridge to holes 7 through 14, a bridge to holes 15 to 17 and a bridge to the 18th."








Harding Park's layout follows the original routing as designed by architect **Willie Watson** in 1925. The course takes advantage of the property's existing topography, contours and vegetation. The predominant features include the towering Monterey Cypress trees and the nearby presence of Lake Merced. Harding's strategy and character have been substantially enhanced with the inclusion of several carefully placed bunkers and re-contoured green complexes. The addition of multiple teeing surfaces provides the course the flexibility to offer distinct playing characteristics that will challenge every golfer, from beginner to the most skilled player.

The course currently hosts the Champion's Tour Charles Schwab Cup every Fall and hosted the eighth Presidents Cup. San Francisco is only the second U.S. city selected to host the event and the first location on the West Coast.

U.S. Team Captain Fred Couples and International Team Captain Greg Norman, both major championship winners and Presidents Cup veterans led their star-studded teams on the course with the US beating the Europeans 19-1/2 to 14-1/2.

Royal Melbourne Golf Club in Australia will host the event in 2011, becoming the first golf course outside the United States to host The Presidents Cup more than once.

Philadelphia Country Club is one of the oldest country clubs in the country. In 1890, John C. Bullitt, an enthusiastic sportsman persuaded a small group of socially prominent Philadelphians to join him in organizing a country club for riding and driving. They purchased a sixty acre property in Bala adjoining Fairmount Park, and constructed a Polo field; hence the horse head logo. A nine-hole Golf course was completed on the site in 1892.

Due to the rise in the popularity of Golf, the Club purchased land for an 18 hole Golf course in Gladwyne in 1926. The Spring Mill course was originally designed by architect **William Flynn**, and while many changes had taken place over the decades since it was originally designed, the Club recently returned to the previous design.

In 1990, on the occasion of the Club's Centennial Anniversary, an additional nine holes, designed by **Tom Fazio**, were dedicated as the Centennial Nine. In 1939, The U.S. Open was held on the Spring Mill course, with Byron Nelson winning in a nail-biting ending.

He eventually won a playoff with Denny Shute and Craig Wood to claim the Championship, after Sam Snead made an eight on the seventy-second hole. A bogey six would have given Snead the victory, a title that he never won in his illustrious career.

In 2003, the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship was held here. Keeping in the Championship mode, the 2005 U.S. Amateur Championship was held here, as the secondary Club, for the early rounds.











Paa-Ko Ridge Golf Club...

is a 27-hole upscale public golf course designed by award-winning architect, **Ken Dye** and situated on the east side of the Sandia Mountains, at elevations ranging from 6,500 to 7,000 feet. The layout of the course features landing areas and greens separated by arroyos, native vegetation, and rock outcroppings. All holes feature spectacular high-desert and mountain views, strong golf-shot values and a serenity not often found anymore.






Towa Golf Resort

They utilized the natural topography and unique natural rock and indigenous piñon trees to create a magnificent, high desert golf course surrounded by the majestic Sangre de Cristo and Jemez mountains.





















California Golf Club of San Francisco

When is the best a course has ever been?

In the case of many California courses built during the Golden Age, the answer is frequently within its first decade. Some of the greatest designs ever seen in the United States- Lakeside, Bel-Air, and Los Angeles – were radically changed for the worse prior to World War II. Other designs like Pasatiempo were compromised by the subsequent residential component that was built too close to the playing corridors. Only a few clubs like the Valley Club of Montecito have retained and/or returned the best playing attributes of the course's original design.

Yet, there is one club that has returned the best Golden
Age design features to its course and taken full
advantage of the finest aspects of modern golf architecture
and agronomy. The result is a startling transformation that
makes the California Golf Club of San Francisco arguably one of
the golf-rich state's five finest courses for the first time in its history.

Originally incorporated in 1918, the club moved from its Ingleside location to its present site in 1924. The club hired the Scot **Willie Locke** to do the original routing and the opportunity presented to him was excellent as the property measured over 550 acres. Whatever the reason, the club elected to replace Locke with **A. (Arthur) Vernon**

Macan who made quite a name for himself throughout the pacific northwest but his disdain for travel meant he never achieved the same standing of his more famous Golden Age contemporaries.


Macan deserves full credit for the original greens, tees, and bunkering and was thus credited as the architect of the course when it opened.


Macan's greenside bunkering and green contours were appealingly bold. However, his fairway bunkering lacked the same inspiration so in 1927 when it came time to address the fairway bunkers, the club elected to go with **Alister MacKenzie**, who was to redesign all the bunkering and rebuild at least two of the greens (the tenth and eighteenth).

In 2005 to answer to a nematode problem, **Kyle Phillips** came in with a bold proposal to relocate the practice area and recreate five entirely new holes. To Phillips's everlasting credit, three of the new holes (the third, seventh and eighth) are among the best on the course. Just as important, Phillips knew when to leave well enough alone. No outside events had materially impaired the back nine as they had the front. Thus, there was a sense that the club possessed a relatively untouched nine that featured MacKenzie's own indelible stamp and today the course is among the top courses in the country, making GOLFWEEK's Top 100 Classic courses.













This unique 7200-yard championship golf course designed by **Ed Shearon** features majestic views of the vineyards as it meanders subtly through the Pinelands. The course offers strategic elements that create risk and reward opportunities on every hole. The meticulously maintained tees, fairways, greens and ponds accentuate the high-quality play which Renault crafted in its original plan. In its fifth year of

operation, it remains a favorite course among discriminating golfers. Public play is welcome as are yearly and lifetime memberships Whether it is golfing for personal enjoyment, social networking or a framework for the perfect business meeting, Renault Winery Resort & Golf offers the ideal location.
























Torresdale Golf Club was established in 1896 by a group of local businessmen. After two nine hole courses were laid out on two different properties, in 1920, members of Frankford Golf Club (founded in 1897), also a nine hole golf course located on the present site of Frankford High School, were planning to relocate so the members of both clubs decided to combine and bring in **Donald Ross** to design the present course except for changes necessitated when Grant Avenue was widened in 1963.

Torresdale-Frankford Country Club hosted two national championships in the early 1940's. Sam Snead holds the course record of 64 which he posted in the Philadelphia Open held at TFCC in September of 1941.

















Coronado Municipal Golf Course is an 18-hole, par 72 course boasting immaculately manicured greens, wide inviting fairways, with dramatic views of the Coronado Bay Bridge, the famous Hotel Del Coronado, the San Diego Bay and the stunning San Diego skyline. Originally designed by architect Jack Daray, this golf course opened to play in 1957. The day it opened, its Head Golf

Professional Don Collett, and a trio of future golf hall-offamers -- Gene Littler, Paul Runyan, and Billy Casper -played the inaugural round of 18 holes that back then extended to a bit over 6100 yards with a par of 75. Coronado Municipal Golf Course continues to reign as one of the finest public golf courses in Southern California.



















Quietly situated on the outskirts of Akron, Ohio, Firestone Country Club has the finest 54-holes of golf of any private club in the country. Established in 1929 by Harvey Firestone, Firestone Country Club remains a one of a kind golf facility. It is the only course in the world to have held three televised golf events in one calendar year - The American Golf Classic, The CBS Golf Classic, and The World Series of Golf. With its three championship level courses, Firestone Country Club is as unique today as it has ever been.

The words Firestone South can conjure up fond memories for many golf fans. Few will forget Jack Nicklaus's magnificent comeback in the 1975 PGA Championship. Down by 5 strokes to Bruce Crampton, Nicklaus made an unbelievable par on the "Monster" 16th hole. He continued his comeback to win by four strokes, collecting his 4th PGA Championship. A more recent memory might be from the 2000 World Golf Championships-NEC Invitational, where Tiger Woods hit the now famous "shot in the dark" on the 18th hole to secure his victory in the event.

Originally designed by the unknown **Burt Way** in 1929 to give the Firestone plant employees a chance to exercise in the beautiful Northeast Ohio scenery, the course has been redesigned by Robert Trent Jones in 1959, Jack Nicklaus in 1985 and lastly by Craig Schrener in 1994 to maintain its toughness and playability in hosting the PGA's best.













Westfield Group Country Club boasts two 18-hole championship courses with first-class amenities and accommodations. Operated by Westfield's expert team of golf

professionals, the private facilities are among the best in Northeastern Ohio.

South Course

Originally built in 1937 as a nine-hole course for Westfield Group employees, the historic South Course is nearly 6,600 yards of meticulously manicured playing surface. Designed by **Geoffrey S. Cornish**, the par-71 course has been host site for the Junior Ryder Cup Matches (2004) and home to the Westfield Junior PGA Championship (2001-2007). It boasts slope rating of 131 and a 72 USGA rating. Greens and fairways are bent grass.

Since the club's beginning, its fine recreational facilities have provided a unique, relaxed atmosphere for employees, agents and members to enjoy one another's company, strengthen friendships and establish lasting business relationships.















Maderas Golf Club San Diego

San Diego's top rated golf course, Maderas Golf club is quietly tucked away amidst the rolling hills of north San Diego, just minutes from downtown. Designed by **Johnny Miller** and **Robert Muir Graves**, Maderas offers a unique combination of golf course strategy and design mastery, while taking the concept of upscale golf in San Diego to exhilarating levels.

The creative designers interlaced three lakes, five waterfalls, rock outcroppings, forests and over 40 acres of natural wildflowers that are seen throughout the entire golf course. The Maderas Golf Club features natural rock formations with sweeping elevation changes to provide excellent playing conditions for a challenging and unforgettable day of golf. Additional impressive amenities include an outstanding driving range, state of the art short game facility all grass tees, an upscale pro shop and a wide variety of golf instruction. The Italian villa style clubhouse is home to The Grille restaurant that features award-winning cuisine sure to enhance your San Diego dining experience.

The course rating is 75.2 and it has a slope rating of 143 and opened in 1999 and is ranked the #1 golf course in San Diego County 2003/04, 2004/05, 2005/06, 2006/07 and 2007/08 by Zagat Survey.
