

The beautiful 18-hole championship Duke University Golf Course opened in 1957 and is the only **Robert Trent Jones**-designed course in the region.


The Duke course was immediately labeled one of the top university golf facilities in the nation. The accolades were great enough to attract the 1962 NCAA Golf Championships. Ironically, there was a soon-to-be-famous golf course architect playing in that NCAA field from Yale University. His name was Rees Jones, eldest son of the Duke golf course designer.

In 1988, university officials recognized that the golf course desperately needed restoration. While no one denied the magnificent routing of its holes, the condition of the course had become unacceptable by Duke University standards.

Rees Jones, now a master architect in his own right, was the only choice for this redesign. Final major construction began in June, 1993 and was completed in April, 1994. It would be difficult to describe the loving care that Rees Jones put into the design of each and every feature of the course. Throughout the redesign, he scrutinized every shot possibility, observed and considered every angle to insure that each nuance of the course would be subtle and perfectly placed.

Again in 2001, Duke University Golf Club was chosen to host the NCAA Men's Golf Championship and today the Course consistently receives top rankings from *Golf Digest, GolfWeek, Golf Magazine* and the *Zagat Survey*. Six PGA Professionals and one Master PGA Professional are on staff and available for group or private lessons.

The Triangle Business Journal recently voted the Duke University Golf Course as the best public course in the Triangle.

Nestled in the fragrant pine forest of North Carolina, you will find an experience unlike any other. Two 18-hole **Donald Ross** designed resort golf courses have earned their place among the country's best golf resorts – and one to which guests and USGA Championships return

The Mid Pines course remains exactly as Donald Ross numbered and routed the course in 1921. Impeccably manicured to modern standards, Mid Pines is a classic gem,

PINEHURST COURSE NO. 7





Pinehurst features 8 unique golf courses, making it the largest golf resort in America. Ross, Fazio, Maples, Jones and most recently, Coore & Crenshaw have made each course a unique test of golf. Pinehurst No. 2, No. 8, No. 7 and No. 4 are consistently ranked among the world's best, while Nos. 1 & 3 reflect Donald Ross's most original Pinehurst works.

Pinehurst No. 7 is one of the boldest and most dramatic golf courses at Pinehurst.

The **Rees Jones**-designed course uses landforms in equal parts to assist and challenge the golfer - down off many tees into the fairway, back up on a number of holes into the greens. From the wetlands that dot the landscape-particularly on the short, par 4 7th hole, the "fingers" of bunkers on the 16th and the large, undulating greens, this course is as visually stimulating as it is challenging.

Sculpted from the rolling hills of Los Angeles in the shadows of the Santa Monica Mountains, MountainGate Country Club features three 9-hole courses – the North, South and Lake Courses – that can be played in any combination, all designed by noted golf course architect **Ted Robinson**. Robinson built the links-style layouts to blend harmoniously with their surroundings, leaving the terrain completely natural. Lush stands of trees frame undulating Bermuda fairways and manicured bentgrass greens, with deep roughs, expansive bunkers, and an abundance of sparkling water features creating both strategic diversity and a picturesque backdrop for golf.


















The History of Lincoln Park Golf Course

At the turn of the 20th century there were no municipal golf courses in San Francisco or, for that matter, in any of the surrounding communities. However by 1902 golf was fast gaining popularity, and many private golf and country clubs were starting. The general public, who did not have access or were unable to afford the country club setting for golfing recreation, began to press the City to set aside some public land to be groomed as a public golf course.

In 1902 the parcel of land now referred to as Lincoln Park was a cemetery, which was named Potter's Field.

At the beginning of 1902 two men, Jack Neville and Vincent Whitney, approached John McLaren, San Francisco's steward of public parks in the early century, about the prospect of constructing a municipal golf course. Jack Neville at the time was a member of the recently formed Claremont Country Club in Oakland and was considered



one of the finest amateur golfers in the country in the early part of the century. Vincent Whitney was a member of the Olympic Club and owned the Whitney Building, which stood for years on lower Geary Street. Both of these men were wealthy members of private clubs but were very instrumental in starting San Francisco's first municipal golf course.

John McLaren suggested that the Potter's Field site would be a good place for the city and for Neville and Whitney to try their hand at constructing some golf holes. At the time golf was still considered a game to be played on links land as near to the ocean as possible, and Potter's Field, despite it being an existing cemetery, was considered a good site. By the end of 1902 a three hole layout was completed on the hilly, windswept, and almost treeless land. These three holes occupied what is presently the first, twelfth and thirteenth holes of the modern course.

During 1909 the Board of Supervisors by legislative action approved the complete removal of the cemetery and further construction continued on the public golf course on the Potter's field site. In an historical news account filed by Raymond Bartlett on December 19, 1915 in the Sunday *San Francisco Chronicle* he states: "In 1909 the ground occupied by the present course was the abiding place of the City's dead. By a resolution of the Board of Supervisors the ground was turned over to the Park Commission. The tract then embraced 150 acres. (At a later date) fifty acres were turned over to the United States government and added to the Fort Miley reservation, while the balance was kept to be improved for the enjoyment of the public. In the same year in which the cemetery was removed the Park Commissioners surveyed a course plan for (a full) eighteen holes, following a plan suggested by some of the foremost experts of the country."

By the 1920s golf was fast becoming a popular game. The number of players desiring to play exceeded capacity during daylight hours and another city golf course to the south was on the drawing board. The numerous renovations have added an interesting element to a course, that was once a burial ground and is presently the surrounding home of a beautiful art museum. Lincoln Park Golf Course, at Lands End in San Francisco with its majestic views of the Golden Gate and the Pacific Ocean that rival any of the Monterrey golf courses, has always been a beautiful public asset to be treasured.













Cog Hill Golf & Country Club is located just 30 miles southwest of Chicago and features four championship golf courses, including Dubsdread, which is ranked among the Top 100 courses in the country by Golf Magazine and Golf Digest.

The story begins with brothers, John W., Martin J., and Bert Coghill who lived on a farm in Monticello, Indiana, and were hired by Western Union to string wire from their hometown to Chicago in the early part of this century. By the time they got to Chicago, they considered themselves electricians, joined the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (Local 134) and began the Coliseum Electrical Company at 5422 South Halsted Street, in 1920.

In the early twenties, they went to a golf outing sponsored by the electrical union at Oak Hills Country Club in Palos Heights. None of them had played golf, but they thought the game looked like fun, was easy, and they had a good time. They decided "we're plungers" and began looking for a site to build a golf course. Their search brought them 28 miles Southwest of Chicago to Lemont.

The Village of Lemont is located on a bluff that overlooks the Des Plaines River Valley. The hills and valleys of Lemont were carved out by the Wisconsin glacier during the last ice age. The change in elevation between the floor of the valley and the hills of Cog Hill are a striking contrast to the plains of Illinois. This land reminded the Coghills of land around their birthplace. They found the McLaughlin farm East of town and bought it with money they borrowed from Orland State Bank. Next, they hired David McIntosh, who owned Oak Hills, to build them a golf course.

Through the years courses were added and in 1964, **Dick Wilson** and **Joe Lee** were brought in to design an award-winning course worthy of national golf championships. Their design would be nationally ranked since it opened in 1964, and the 4th course at Cog Hill would soon acquire the nickname, "DUBSDREAD." A natural style championship golf course, DUBSDREAD places a demand on shot making by providing tight landing areas combined with heavily bunkered, large undulating greens. It currently hosts the BMW Championship but has been a mainstay of the PGA Tour since its opening.
















Downingtown Country Club History

Located in Chester County Downingtown
Country Club's layout reflects many of the great
features of classic Philadelphia golf courses.
With subtle greens, dramatically shaped
bunkers, and open, gently rolling fairways, our
course is a straightforward, fair test of golf, sure
to please all levels of player. Course
conditioning is maintained at the highest
standard.

This 6619 yard, par-72 golf course was designed by **George Fazio** and built between 1965 and 1967. Mr. Fazio, the uncle of modern course architect Tom Fazio, was a runner-up to Ben Hogan in the 1950 U.S. Open at Merion Golf Club, and the touring professional out of Pine Valley Golf Club for a number of years.



Barton Creek Resort & Spa's signature golf course is an astonishingly beautiful design masterpiece by **Tom Fazio**. The architectural layout features dramatic cliff-lined fairways, natural limestone caves, waterfalls, and superb TiffEagle Bermuda greens, which gives golfers 18 holes of pure pleasure with no lack of challenge. This unforgettable golfing experience provides plenty of elevation change and visual impact.

The Fazio Foothills course, established in 1986, ranks at the top of all experts' lists. Golfweek Magazine rates the Foothills #4 among America's 50 Best Resort Courses. The course is also named the Best Resort Course in Texas and has the distinction of consistently having several holes listed among the State's Best or Most Beautiful Holes (holes #12, 4, 9, 16, 10, 18) recognized by the Dallas Morning News.





The Black Course is the most testing layout of the massive municipal 90 hole complex on Long Island, New York originally envisioned and mapped out by Joe Burbeck, a New York state engineer, with the consulting advice and suggestions of the legendary A.W. Tillinghast. As to who deserves final recognition as designer of the course, the question is currently controversial. With regard to the course's merits in hosting the U.S. Open there is no controversy. Rees Jones was hired to restore and update the layout for the 2002 U.S. Open, the first held on a truly democratic (affordable to the average earner) public course in many years. Even before renovations, public players would line up sleeping in the parking lot for tee times on this historic course.

In Tillinghasts' own words from "Reminiscences of the Links" - "Now it was Burbeck's idea to develop one of these layouts along lines, which were to be severe to a marked degree. It was his ambition to have something which might compare with Pine Valley as a great test...I am rather inclined to believe from reports from some of the best players that it is showing plenty of teeth. In contemplating the difficulties of the Black, I have in mind particularly the long 4th, a par 5. When this is played from the full length of the teeing-ground it should prove one of the most exacting three-shotters I know of anywhere. In locating and designing the green, which can only be gained by a most precise approach from the right, I must confess that I was a trifle scared myself, when I looked back and regarded the hazardous route that must be taken by a stinging second shot to get into position to attack this green." Mr. Tillinghast goes on to call the course "The Black Leopard" and compares it evenly with the mythical Pine Valley.

















The Golf Club at Gray's Crossing, a **Peter Jacobsen/Jim Hardy** designed championship golf course nestled in Truckee, Calif., gives golfers a premier 36-hole mountain golf resort experience, which includes its sister course, Old Greenwood.



Towering Lodgepole and Jeffrey Pines line the fairways as the course weaves through a natural mountain surrounding with Mt. Rose as its backdrop. When calculating each shot, the environment plays as much a role as the course.

Also, at Gray's Crossing, you don't have to be a member to feel like one. The club prides itself in bringing golfers the highest standards in golf with a professional golf staff, practice facility, tournament conditions, and valet service.

Nestled among 600 acres of towering pines in the mountains near North Lake Tahoe, lies Old Greenwood Golf Course, 18 holes of perfection courtesy of Jack Nicklaus. Old Greenwood was rated among the 10 Best New Public-Access Courses in the Country by Golf Magazine and rated number four among America's Finest New Upscale Public Courses by Golf Digest.





Coyote Moon

Coyote Moon Golf Course is one of the finest mountain golf experiences in the country. The course sits on 250 acres of secluded rolling hills amidst towering pines, enormous granite outcroppings, wildflowers and the beautiful Trout Creek. The vistas plus fresh mountain air equals near perfection. Without a single home to spoil the view, playing Coyote Moon offers an experience seldom found in golf today.

Coyote Moon Golf Course is a challenging but fair test of golf. All levels of golfers will be tested, yet all will enjoy their round. Most tee shots offer ample landing areas as there are

only a few forced carries. From the landing areas, most holes funnel down to medium-sized, undulating greens that are well protected by trees, sand and water. The golf course was designed by **Brad Bell**, a former PGA Tour player, well known for creating highly praised golf courses around the central valley.

Coyote Moon is located in the historic town of Truckee, California. It is easily accessed from both Sacramento and Reno and is a quick 15 minute drive to the shores of Lake Tahoe.

















Vale do Lobo is home to two challenging and outstanding golf courses - the Royal and the Ocean.

Based on original concepts by the legendary Sir Henry Cotton and re-developed by the respected American golf architect **Rocky Roquemore**, the Vale do Lobo courses have twice been host to the Portuguese Open. Both take players through umbrella pine and fig tree-lined fairways to the Atlantic – the Royal playing dramatically along the cliff's edge, while the Ocean sweeps daintily down to the beach.

The Ocean Golf Course features undulating fairways which run alongside a nature reserve, before leading gently down to the shores of the Atlantic. The front nine is located on a slightly hilly land which characterizes Vale do Lobo,

surrounded by pine trees with sea view from several holes. The back nine in particular is characterized by spectacular ocean views, with some holes almost stretching down to the beach. On reaching the brow of the hill on the 11th, players come suddenly upon a sight fit to take the most concentrated golfer's breath away.

The fairway runs directly down towards the beach and, for the next few holes, outstanding views and Atlantic breezes are guaranteed to make a player's round exhilarating, even if his game is below expectations.





Alcaidesa Links Golf Resort is located in a unique environment surrounded by the exquisite towns in Sotogrande and Valderrama, and famous landmarks such as Gibraltar. It is a place where style, nature, views, miles of unspoiled beach, restaurants, hotels, properties for living all year, and the best golf come together to offer one of the most exclusive areas of southern Spain.

Alcaidesa Links Golf Resort boasts two magnificent golf courses: Alcaidesa Links and Heathland Alcaidesa, a total of 36 professional holes with spectacular views of the sea, Gibraltar and Africa. The two miles of beach parallel to Alcaidesa Links and always extraordinary blue of the sea create a unique visual spectacle on the Costa del Sol.

The Alcaidesa Links course is a magnificent 18-hole Links course Par 72, opened in 1992 and designed by **Peter Ellis** and **Clive Clark**. The topography of the land of Alcaidesa consists of gentle slopes that descend towards the sea, ending in a beautiful beach, creating a front of nearly 2 km so that many of its holes line the beach. The difficulty of the course lies mainly in the condition of the prevailing winds of the place.

One of the peculiarities of the course that most impresses visitors is its spectacular views of the Mediterranean, Gibraltar and Africa. Its total length is: 5866 m.

Alcaidesa Links has been included in 2011 within the top 20 golf links on the European continent by the prestigious magazine Golf World.























Forest Highlands Canyon Golf Course

The upwardly sweeping walls of Ponderosa pines frame this perfectly composed experience at the Canyon Golf Course.

Created in 1986 by Tom Weiskopf and Jay Morrish, the Forest Highlands Canyon course is an exercise in breathtaking beauty and challenging sport. It has been ranked among the top 100 courses in the world by Golf Magazine and rated by Golf Digest as the #1 golf course in Arizona. The beautiful par 71 course measures 7,001 yards from the championship tees and is CLEARLY not the typical Arizona golf course. The desert is far behind and the course, with its sister Meadows course, is lined with the same type of enormous pines you'd expect in Tahoe and Colorado not Arizona.

The course is fun, playable, strategic and beautiful all at the same time. It features a unique routing with six par 3s, seven par 4s and five par 5s. That type of unique design

keeps the course interesting and gives a unique feel that often isn't found in a standard par 72 course with four par 3, 10 par 4s, and four par 5s. The Canyon has personality and while Arizona is known for its warm weather winter golf, the truth is that one of the state's best courses is buried under snow all winter long.

When returning to Phoenix after the round, on your way down the mountain, take the scenic route and pass through Sedona. It is by far one of the prettiest drives you'll ever make. Red rocks and canyon walls as far as the eye can see will give you another glimpse of what Arizona has to offer.







Situated on 230 acres of breathtaking countryside in the heart of Princeton, NJ, TPC Jasna Polana continues to redefine the private club experience – boasting an award-winning championship golf course designed by the legendary Gary Player.

Innovative design and a reverence for nature are the hallmarks of truly great golf courses, and TPC Jasna Polana's championship layout is no exception.

Considered among the top private golf courses in the New Jersey, TPC Jasna Polana's par-72, 7,098-yard championship layout blends harmoniously with its surroundings amidst the rolling hills of Princeton. Corridors of mature hardwood trees frame manicured fairways. Numerous lakes, creeks and ponds add to the golf course's strategic diversity as well as its spectacular beauty.

The golf course finishes with a spectacular risk/reward finishing hole, a 515-yard, par-5 18th hole, which favors long hitters.

Per Gary Player's philosophy as an architect, the golf course should be enjoyable for the average golfer and be versatile enough to set up for a PGA TOUR event and challenge the pros. TPC Jasna Polana features five sets of tees on each hole. While the golf course measures near 7,100 from the tips, the members can play from a either 6,500 or 6,000 yards.

As part of the TPC Network, playing conditions at TPC Jasna Polana are maintained to PGA TOUR-quality standards year-round. Complementing the golf course is a 3.5-acre quality practice facility which features a 60,000 square-foot practice tee, four putting greens and practice bunkers.

TPC Jasna Polana played host to the Champions Tour's Instinet Classic for 3 years from 2000-2002 and also hosted a Shell's Wonderful World of Golf match in 1999, where Tom Watson defeated Hale Irwin.





































The Brandywine Country Club, located in historic Brandywine Valley, was founded September 10, 1945. Its beginnings were the shared idea of a number of prominent area businessmen. Meeting regularly in a downtown Wilmington storefront, these founding members discussed a common concern-there increasing need for a quality golf course. The obvious solution quickly became a unanimous decision to form their own club and build a new golf course.

Drawing on the support of friends and well wishers, the planners purchased land and a three-bedroom farmhouse on Route 202. The land was originally a 160-acre farm owned by William Luke, owner of the Oldsmobile agency in Wilmington. In June, 1946, Arthur Tull, who had designed the Dupont Country Club course, was selected to design the new Brandywine Country Club golf course. The total cost of the entire project, including renovating the main building of the farmhouse, was \$232,000. Within two years, construction and renovations were completed on the long-awaited golf course and club house.

In 1985, the old clubhouse and land adjacent to Route 202 was sold and a new clubhouse was built on Shipley Road. Ault, and Clark & Associates redesigned portions of the golf course to accommodate the new clubhouse. In July 2005, Brandywine closed its course for a complete renovation, which included rebuilding all greens and green surrounds, tees and bunkers. All fairways were stripped of grass, and then completely re-seeded with state-of-the-art bent grass. Landscapes Unlimited was awarded the construction project and Brian Ault led the design team.

For sixty-five years, the Brandywine Country Club has enjoyed an outstanding reputation for its first-rate golf course and inviting atmosphere. Today that tradition of excellence and hospitality continues. With the re-opening of the spectacular new golf course, the Brandywine Country Club has ensured its future and positioned itself as one of the premier clubs in the Delaware Valley.



Situated deep in the rolling terrain of central Pennsylvania, another world of exhilarating golf awaits! A place where carefully designed courses harmonize with the natural beauty of the surroundings. The Penn State Golf Courses offer golfers the very best the game has to offer--from the trip up its tree-lined drive to finest in course facilities and personalized service to the relaxing atmosphere in the Walker Clubhouse.

Golf has been played at the university since the first rise in popularity of the sport in the United States in the latter half of the 19th century. However, the sport was not popular enough to merit a formalized golf course until 1921 when two professors, **Bob Rutherford** and **R.D. Pryde**, laid out nine holes on the west end of campus. The sport apparently became quite popular as nine additional holes were laid out in 1922 by noted golf course architect **Willie Park, Jr.,** with the work being completed in 1926. While keeping the general layout of the initial nine holes, Park significantly altered the greens and bunkers to match his own style of design.

The Willie Park course came to be known as the College Golf Course, since the school had yet to be named a full-fledged university. The course featured large push-up style greens and some dramatic bunkering much like those found at Park's Sunningdale (Old) Course. Wide fairways and closely mown areas around the green integrated the features together and provided a diverse play field for Penn State golfers. When the Blue Course was added in the late 60's the Willie Park course was renamed the White Course. And it remains that way today!













The 36-hole Indian Wells Golf Resort is one of the nation's top ranked resorts featuring signature golf courses, of course and a magnificent 53,000 squarefoot clubhouse. It is no surprise it is the only facility in California with two courses ranked in the Top 20 "Best Courses You Can Play" in California by Golfweek Magazine. Golf Channel's popular Big Break series was contested at Indian Wells Golf Resort for its 15th season and showcased the resort's championship golf courses - Celebrity Course & Players Course. The Celebrity Course is also a two-time host to the PGA TOUR's Skins Game.



The **John Fought**-designed Players Course opened in November 2007. The Players Course features a classic American design complete with sculpted bunkers in a style reminiscent of Riviera, Winged Foot and the brilliant golf courses created by Dr. Alistair Mackenzie near Melbourne, Australia.

Uniquely, Fought was able to seamlessly integrate many stately trees found on the original properties into his new designs to impart the unique feel of an older venerable facility while at the same time delivering a modern approach to golf course design. Most of the holes are oriented to take full advantage of jawdropping views of the San Jacinto, Santa Rosa and San Bernardino mountain ranges and majestic Eisenhower Mountain stands sentinel to the south.



Clive Clark's much anticipated Celebrity Course opened November 2006 to rave reviews. In addition to spectacular mountain views, the Par-72 Celebrity Course features undulating fairways, and flowing water in the form of streams, brooks, and split-level lakes connected by striking waterfalls, with vibrant floral detail.























From start to finish, the Celebrity Course offers an unmatched golf experience that will have players returning again and again.
