



Envisioned as the centerpiece of a master-planned community, Valencia Country Club was built in 1965 by legendary golf course architect **Robert Trent Jones, Sr.** His course at Valencia has long been recognized as one of the best golf courses in all of Southern California, for its challenging layout, beautiful conditions, and complex greens. Originally a public course when it opened, the course was transitioned into a private club in the 80's. Since then it has remained private and exclusive but ask anyone in the area who played it as a public facility, and they will tell you just how amazing Big V is.

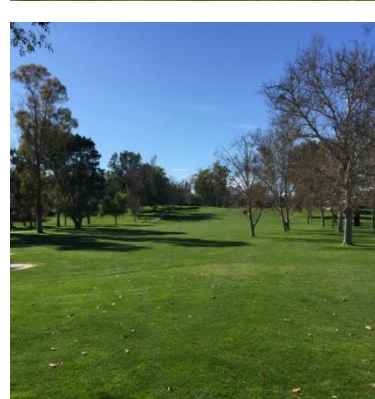
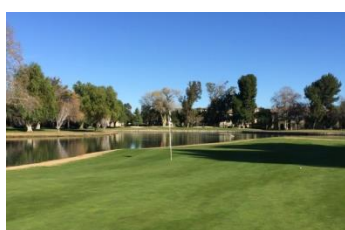
The quality of golfers that have played Valencia Country Club mirrors the quality of the course. The course has been fortunate enough to have its fairways graced with the presence of some of golf's living legends. In 1998, Valencia Country Club played host to The Nissan Open, once known as the Los Angeles Open, renamed today as the Northern Trust Open. From 2001 through 2009, the Club hosted the Senior PGA Tour, now referred to as the Champions Tour. The 1998 Nissan Open was the site of an extremely rare Tiger Woods playoff loss in a PGA Tour event.

Although the Santa Clarita Valley has seen many changes throughout the years, Valencia Country Club still remains a fixture in the community. While its prestige and reputation have grown to legendary status, it is still a beacon for leaders in the community, businesspeople, and a site for families to enjoy themselves, just as it was intended over forty years ago.

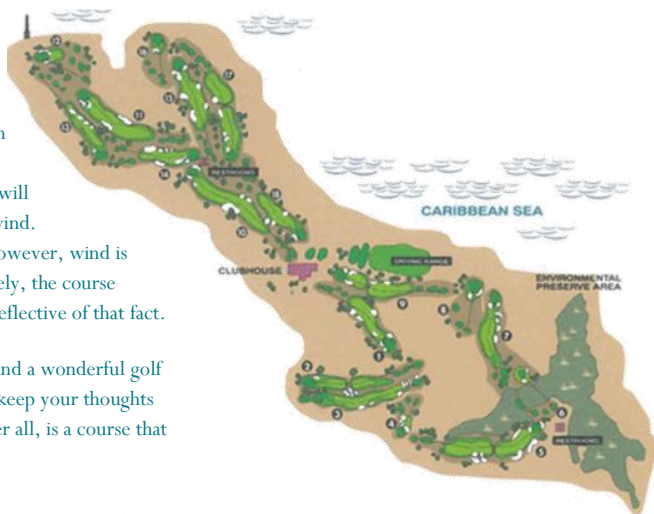




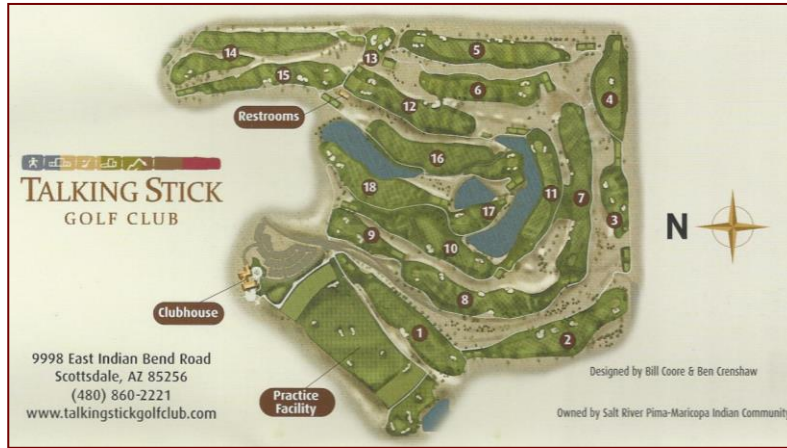


Designed by renowned **Robert Trent Jones II**, Tierra del Sol, situated on the scenic northwest point of Aruba, is the only 18 hole championship golf course on the island. This 18 hole resort resembles no course in Jamaica or St. Thomas. Rather it is more akin to European links courses. With a constant 20-30 mph “breeze” (virtually every day of the year), the course is laid out such that you will play a number of holes downwind before back-tracking against the wind. Because the wind is very predictable, few holes have a cross wind, however, wind is wind, and hitting into a 30 mph breeze can be challenging. Fortunately, the course designers have taken this into consideration and made the yardages reflective of that fact.

From the par shooters to the high handicappers, the course is fair and a wonderful golf challenge. The scenic views on the course make it tough at times to keep your thoughts on golf. For most, it’s the best island golf course. Tierra del Sol, after all, is a course that is meant to be enjoyed more than once in a lifetime.







**Bill Coore** and **Ben Crenshaw** have teamed up to create the remarkable magic that is Talking Stick Golf Club. Found in Scottsdale, Arizona, the club features two uniquely different golf courses that offer several options to golfers of any and all play levels. Owned by the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community, the North and South golf courses blend perfectly with their tranquil desert surroundings, providing a serene yet challenging day of Scottsdale, Arizona golf.

"The South course, with its tree-lined fairways and raised greens defended at the sides offers a more straightforward style of play," according to the architects. The North course tends to get more praise than the South but both are good courses and quite unique in the Phoenix/Scottsdale area because they were constructed on completely flat land. The South Course is a more traditional layout than the North with more trees and water features.

With its striking landforms, expansive lakes, rolling terrain and stretches of open savannah, Streamsong Red brings drama and strategy into play on each spectacular hole.







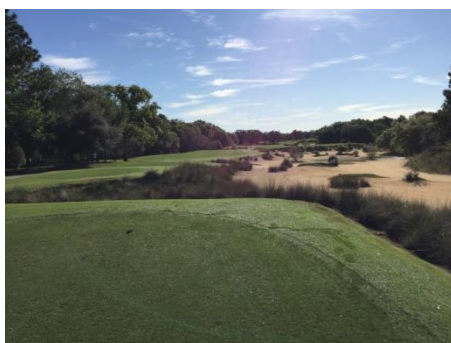
**W**orld Woods Golf Club was developed in 1991 by World Woods Corporation and opened on April 1, 1993. Yukihiisa Inoue, World Woods Corporation President, traveled throughout the world viewing the top ranked golf courses in search of the golf course architect that possessed the distinctive ability to design a masterpiece at World Woods Golf Club. **Tom Fazio's** unique style of utilizing the land's natural layout, character and beauty was most appealing to Inoue. "This is my best work," said Fazio in a recent conversation. The Pine Barrens Course at World Woods, is ranked #26 by Golf Week "Americas Best Modern Course".

Pine Barrens is a visually stunning blend of native terrain and golf course design.



Named for the many pine trees that line its length, the acclaimed layout is sculpted from an expansive pine forest with surprising and dramatic changes in elevation.

The large manicured fairways framed by expansive untamed waste bunkering create a unique golf experience. The course's style has been compared to that of Pine Valley in New Jersey - the consensus No. 1 course in the world. Pine Barrens offers many intimidating, yet, enjoyable holes.



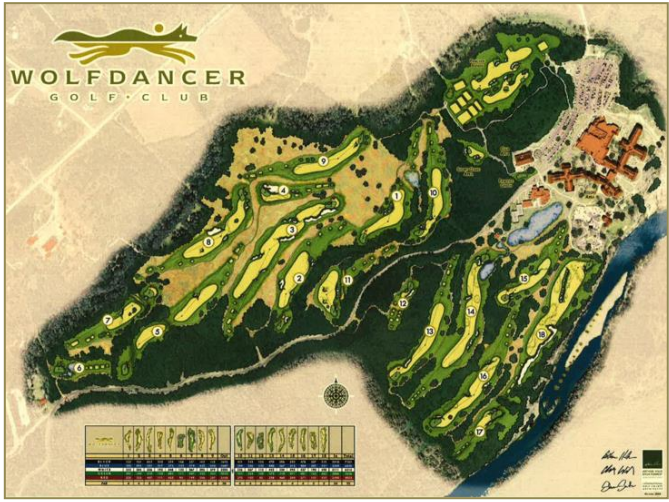




## Wolfdancer Golf Club

Named in honor of the traditional wolf dance of the Tonkawa Indians who once inhabited this area, world-renowned golf architect **Arthur Hills** designed Wolfdancer to take full advantage of the natural lay of the land in the heart of the Texas wilderness. Enjoy the game among native grasses, trees, wildflowers, even a flock of egrets as you play through the rolling prairie, heavily wooded ridgeline and the river valley plain. The dramatic layout is also cut by the Lower Colorado River, which runs alongside the course's memorable finishing holes.

Situated at Hyatt Regency Lost Pines Resort and Spa, Wolfdancer Golf Club is an award-winning golf course just 10 miles from historic downtown Bastrop, 13 miles from Austin-Bergstrom International Airport and 20 miles east of





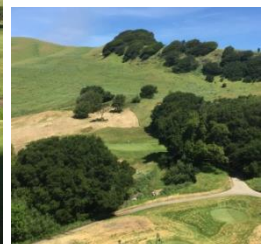
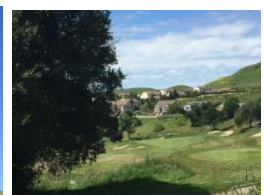

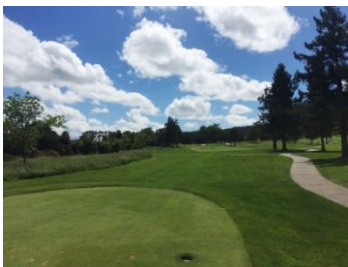
**Hiddenbrooke Golf Club is a world-class championship golf course designed by golf legend, Arnold Palmer.**

Hiddenbrooke Golf Club is proud to be the only course in the surrounding Contra Costa, Marin and Yolo counties to receive the four and a half star rating. Pebble Beach Golf Links and Spyglass Hill are the only two courses in California to receive the five star rating.

The 2010 Golf World Readers' Choice Awards also recognized Hiddenbrooke as the No. 9 Best Public Golf Course in the Nation. Hiddenbrooke is the only course in the San Francisco Bay Area that made the Top 50 list. The Readers' Choice Awards also ranked Hiddenbrooke No. 4 in service, No. 5 overall value, No. 7 clubhouse and No. 10 reputation/prestige.







Playing just over 7,100 yards from the championship tees, the Sonoma Golf Club, designed in 1928 by **Sam Whiting**, offers strategic choices and challenges that excite golfers swinging graphite and titanium just as it did when they were carrying hickory and persimmon.

At its heart, is a treasured "core golf" experience set on 177 acres of rolling terrain highlighted by massive oaks, lakes and sweeping vistas of the Mayacamas Mountains and neighboring vineyards. You're sure to appreciate how the balance and blend of long and short holes creates a perfect rhythm as you move through the round. Considered

a fair but formidable test, unique challenges help keep you focused on the task at hand. Golfers particularly enjoy the distinctive set of Par 3's that offer a great diversity of aesthetic beauty and personal challenge. In fact, three of them are over 200 yards from the back tees.

Sonoma Golf Club was the host of the Charles Schwab Cup Championship; the prestigious season ending tournament of the PGA Champions Tour from 2003-2009. Winners in Sonoma were Jim Thorpe 2003, 2006, 2007, Mark McNulty 2004, Tom Watson 2005, Andy Bean 2008 and John Cook 2009.





A mere ten minutes from Downtown Atlanta, you'll find Buckhead, Georgia, home to Bobby Jones Golf Course. Enriched by the location's Civil War roots, this 5,888-yard course, designed by **John Van Kleeck**, intertwines nature with history as Peachtree Battle Creek meanders through the tree-lined par 70 championship course with scenic views of Midtown Atlanta's skyline. 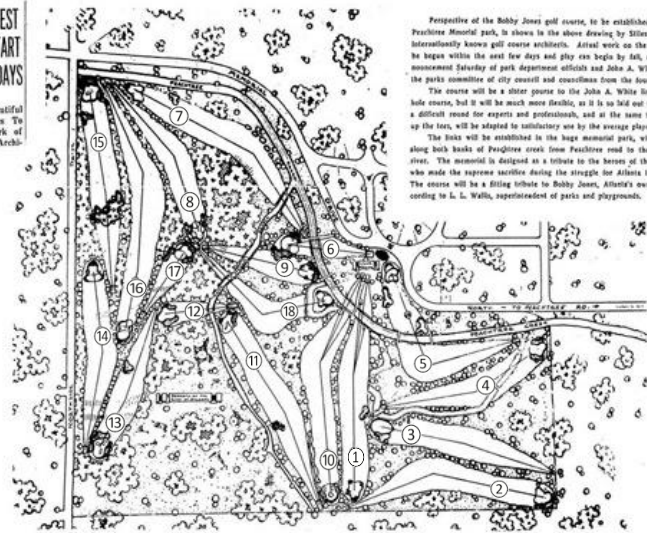

## SURVEY FOR PEACHTREE CREEK MEMORIAL PARK 18-HOLE GOLF COURSE COMPLETED, LINKS WILL BE READY FOR PLAY BY FALL

WORK ON NEWEST COURSE TO START WITHIN FEW DAYS

One of Most Beautiful Municipal Courses To Result From Work of Widely Known Architects.



Perspective of the Bobby Jones golf course, to be established in the gigantic Peachtree Memorial park, is shown in the above drawing by Siler and Van Kleeck, internationally known golf course architects. Actual work on the new course will be begun within the next few days and play can begin by fall, according to announcement yesterday of park department officials and John A. White, chairman of the park committee of city council and co-sponsor of the course.

The course will be a shorter course to the John A. White links, another 18-hole course, but it will be much more flexible, as it is so laid out that it will offer a difficult round for experts and professionals, and at the same time, by moving up the links, will be adapted to satisfactory use by the average player.

The links will be established in the huge memorial park, which will stretch along both banks of Peachtree creek from Peachtree road to the Chattahoochee river. The memorial is designed as a tribute to the heroes of the blue and gray who made the supreme sacrifice during the struggle for Atlanta in the civil war. The course will be a fitting tribute to Bobby Jones, Atlanta's own golf king, according to L. L. White, superintendent of parks and playgrounds.

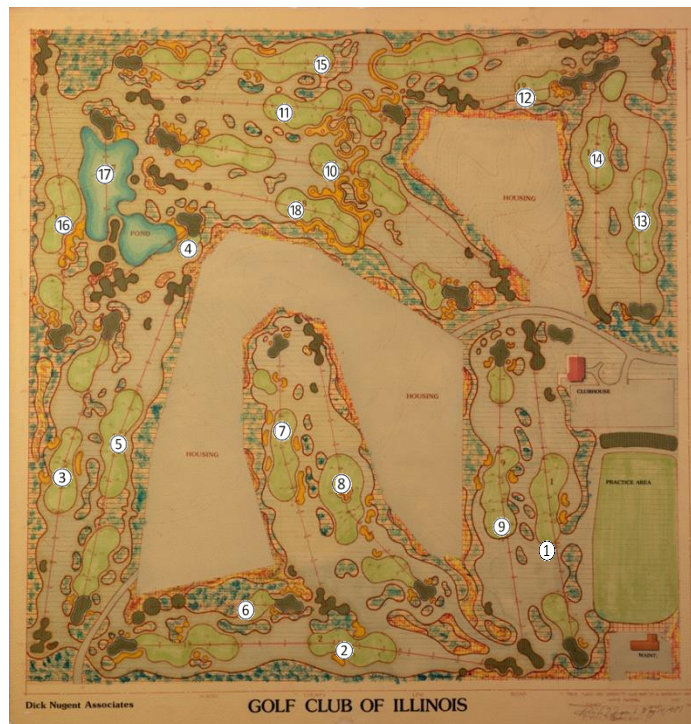

Built in 1987 by **Dick Nugent** and **Bruce Borland**, the Golf Club of Illinois in Algonquin is a classic links-style course featuring high fescue grasses, treacherous sand bunkers, and strategically placed mounds on each hole. Early on, the course quickly developed the reputation as a stern test for all skill levels of golfers, and was consistently ranked



among the top 10 public courses to play by Chicagoland Golf.

In 1990, the Golf Club of Illinois hosted the Illinois Open Championship, which was won by Gary Pinns, the only player to break par in the tournament. Since that time, the course has remained a "secret" favorite for those looking for a unique, challenging round of golf.





On July 20, 1947, there was a banner headline in the Charlotte Observer: NEW COUNTRY CLUB TO BE BUILT ON CARMEL ROAD. The paper reported that an old golf course of eighty- four acres, left to go to ruin in World War II, was being transformed!

Construction began immediately - the first clubhouse opened in 1949, and the golf course, designed by **George Cobb**, opened in 1950. In 1965, membership had grown to over 500 members facilitating the need for a new clubhouse, pool and expanded golf facilities. In November 1967, the current clubhouse was completed.

In 1967, work started on the North Course, and in 1998 it was expanded to 18 holes and to a par 72. In 1998, the clubhouse was expanded to include the Grill, new kitchens and Fitness Center. The classic warmth of Carmel, symbolized by the lamppost lined drive, is always apparent, drawing new faces in and telling the story of its past.

Carmel has earned recognition as a Platinum Club of America, a Five Star Private Club and was named the number 13 private club in America.







The Reserve Vineyards & Golf Club is a 36-hole private and public golf club in the Portland, Oregon metro area in the Pacific Northwest of the United States. The award winning club in Washington County, Oregon, opened in 1997 and hosted the Champions Tour major, The Tradition from 2003 to 2006. It also hosted the now defunct Fred Meyer Challenge from 1998 until the final tournament in 2002.

The North Course, designed by **Bob Cupp** whose award-winning golf architecture accomplishments

Course's trees & terrain are pure Willamette Valley in character, the North Course feels more like playing among Oregon's coastal dunes. The more expansive links-style layout features undulating native grass mounds, distinctive shape, judicious bunkering & formidable greens with short grass surrounds.

The par 72 course measures from 5,241 to 6,845 yards and defies players to hit & hold its greens. Without a doubt, the course's signature hole is the unique 459 yard, par 4 17th, where the green is part of a spectacular 43,000 square foot triple green complex

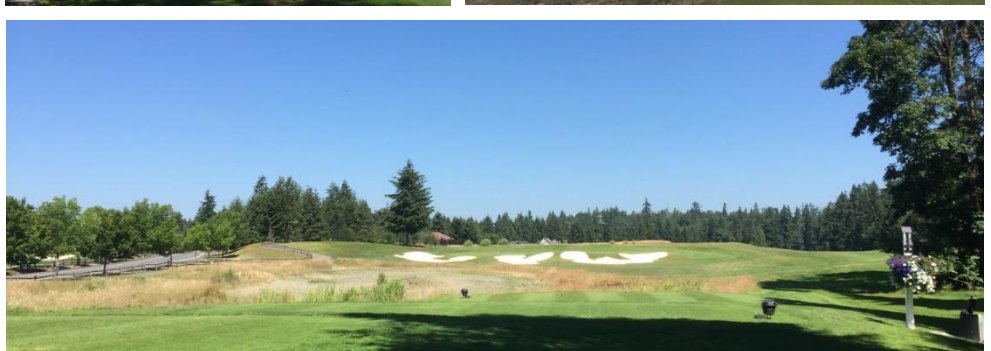
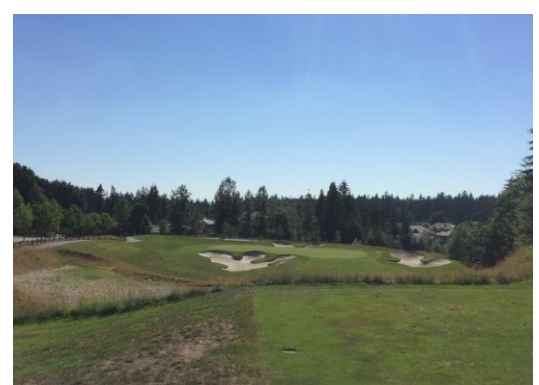




Washington National Golf Club is one of the premier golf courses in the Pacific Northwest. Located just 30 minutes from Seattle, Washington National Golf Club is also the proud home to the University of Washington's Men's and Women's golf teams.

Designed by award-winning architect **John Fought**, the 18-hole championship golf course features an exceptional array of contrasting aesthetics. Rugged transitional areas dotted with native fescue dissect lush, emerald fairways, and spectacular, white-sand bunkers cradle impeccably maintained greens.

The layout increases in challenge and splendor, culminating in a spectacular stretch of golf over the final holes. Wide fairways lure golfers into a sense of security but a wealth of strategically placed hazards challenge even the best shot makers. With tee options ranging from 5,100 to 7,300 yards, Washington National is a demanding test for players of all abilities.

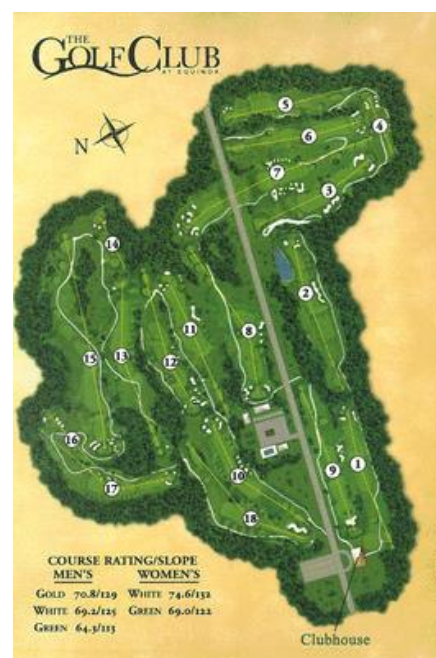




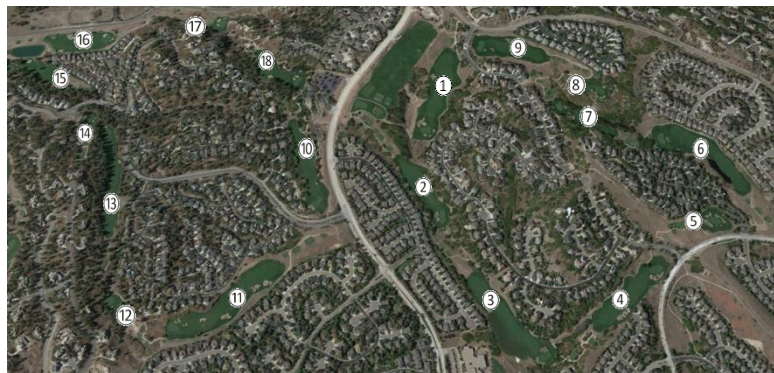
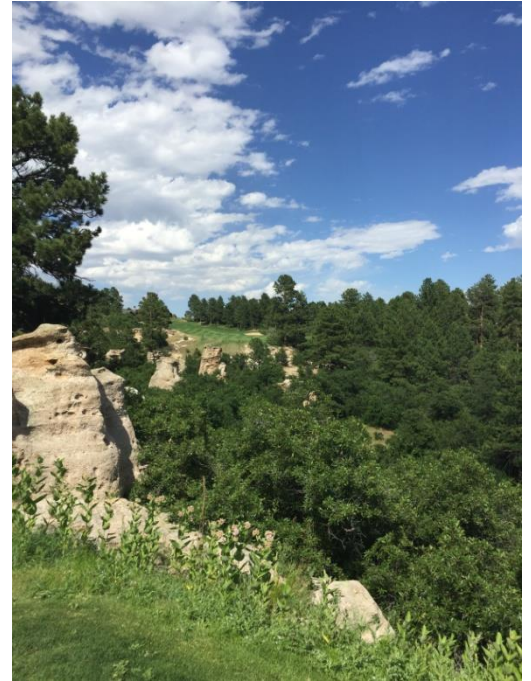


Nestled in the heart of the Green Mountains, this Vermont golf resort is one of the most picturesque settings in the country. Built in 1926 by U.S. amateur champion **Walter Travis** and renovated in 1991 by **Rees Jones**, The Golf Club at The Equinox provides guests with an opportunity to experience a challenging round of golf during their getaway. Managed by Troon, the course has a par 71 and features 6,423 yards of fairways, bunkers and greens.

Throughout its 238-year history, The Equinox has served as one of America's most historically significant lodgings. Boasting a legacy that predates America's independence, the hotel is a bastion of romance, colorful landscapes, and elite accommodations. Since first opening in 1769, The Equinox has hosted national luminaries such as Ulysses S. Grant, Teddy Roosevelt, and Mary Todd Lincoln. This true American treasure offers an elegant and captivating setting on 1,300 acres between the Green and Taconic mountains within minutes of spectacular shopping, quaint boutiques, art galleries, and antique shops.







The Ridge at Castle Pines North, located just south of Denver, Colorado is an award winning example of **Tom Weiskopf's** fluent, well-proportioned layout that presents players with roomy fairways, sculpted bunkers and large, rolling greens.

Carved from a thick forest of Gambel Oaks and Ponderosa Pines in the foothills of the Front Range, The Ridge also traces open terrain where sight lines stretch south to Pike's Peak, Devil's Head and Mt. Evans in the west. The Ridge is one of Colorado's most prestigious and upscale public golf courses. Since opening in 1997, The Ridge has received both national and statewide recognition in various publications. The course has four sets of tees that measure from 5,000 yards to more than 7,000 yards in length.





Knob Hill, New Jersey's premiere semi-private golf club, located in Manalapan, NJ. Knob Hill Golf Club offers both its members and the public an exceptional club experience.

Knob Hill Golf Club is a **Mark McCumber** designed facility. McCumber reflected, "It is important to design a course that would showcase my talent in the Northeast. I am tickled about the way Knob Hill has turned out!" Mark is not alone in appreciating what a terrific course he designed and created at Knob Hill.

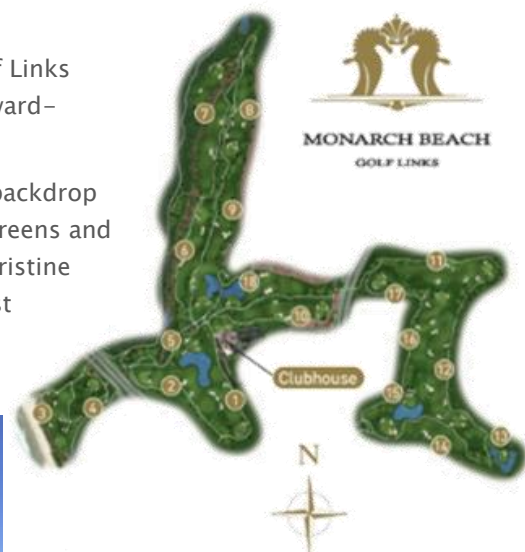




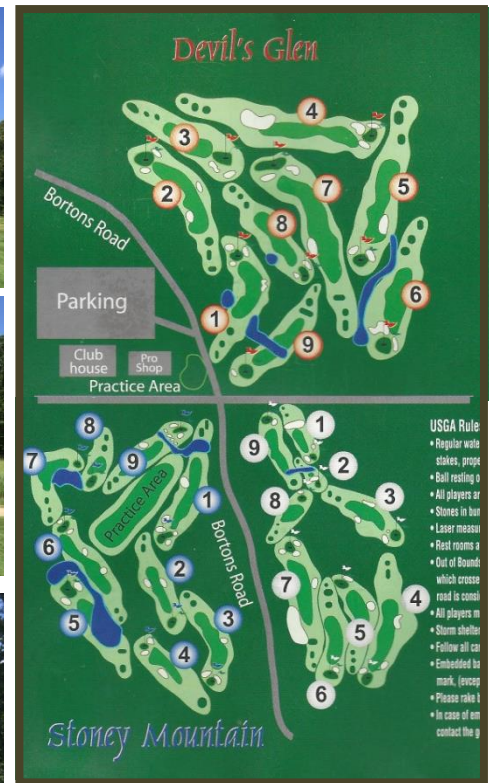
# MONARCH BEACH GOLF LINKS

Designed by the renowned **Robert Trent Jones, Jr.**, the Monarch Beach Golf Links invites guests and members to play an exhilarating round of golf on its award-winning, championship 18-hole golf course.

Modeled in the traditional Scottish links style, and set along the peerless backdrop of the Pacific Ocean, this challenging 6,600-yard course features rolling greens and tight fairways to entice golfers of all skill levels. Monarch Beach Resort's pristine year-round weather, professional golf shop, Club 19 restaurant on the first tee, and professional lessons make this an alluring destination for golf enthusiasts.







There used to be a saw mill here, about a hundred feet or so from the picturesque waterwheel on the last hole of the White Nine. And there was once a vast cranberry bog. Now there are 27 holes of very challenging golf on this tract of land in Marlton, New Jersey, straddling Hopewell Road between Mt. Holly and Berlin. In 1933 Matthew F. Van Instendal bought 100 acres for \$100. Over the next 30 years, he would bring together various parcels adding up to a total of 700 acres. One of those parcels was known as the "Little Mill Tract," and Van Instendal felt that this name was just right for the club. With a view toward preserving the natural beauty of the heavily wooded property, while at the same time making it productive, Matthew and his son, George, decided in 1966 to build an 18-hole golf course.

**Garrett J. Renn**, who was born in Mt. Holly and who served as superintendent of Philadelphia's municipal golf courses from 1950 until he died in an automobile accident in 1968, was retained to lay out the course. Carved out of a forest, each hole is framed by maple, oak, birch, pine, and gum trees. Wildlife abounds, with deer, grouse, and pheasant often to be observed as the player makes

his way down these tranquil alleys. An overall elevation change of 65 feet, unexpected on golf courses in this area, provides an attractively rolling quality to the holes.

When Little Mill opened, on Memorial Day, 1968, it was a semi-private club. Dick Hendrickson, one of the district's half-dozen best players, was named head professional. In 1975 the club became the property of Little Mill Associates (George Van Instendal, I. Budd Rockhower, and Matthew Van Instendal's grandchildren). Subsequently the owners converted Little Mill into a private club and brought in Bill and Dave Gordon to lay out a third nine. Again, trees frame every hole, but this time water puts even more pressure on the swing, imperiling the shot on five of the nine holes. A combination of this third nine (Blue) and the White Nine, longest of the three at almost 3,500 yards from the back tees, is particularly stern, producing a Slope of 136. Important district competitions would be played at Little Mill in the years to come, with this eighteen more than holding its own against strong professional fields.





From the moment it opened in late 2006, Fallen Oak Golf Course has impressed golfers and reviewers alike with its dramatic elevation changes and more than 4,000 stately oaks, magnolias, pines and other hardwood trees, interspersed with ponds, streams and wetlands.

The 18-hole private golf course, designed by Tom Fazio, measures 7,487 yards from the longest tees. The course features 10 bridges and concealed cart paths to protect and enhance the natural features of the terrain.

The challenge is obvious from the first hole, a par-5 with a dogleg left. A huge water oak serves as the target off the tee. Streams and a lake border the fairway and green.

The finishing hole features remarkably elevated tees with views of the bunker-abundant par-4 as well as the classically styled clubhouse perched on the hill overlooking the 18th green and the golf course's namesake live oak.

Fallen Oak is ranked as the top course in Mississippi by Golf Digest and Golfweek Magazine selected Fallen Oak as No. 2 on its 25-course list of Best Casino Courses for 2007.







## Welcome to TPC Louisiana

Bringing championship golf to the vibrant charm of New Orleans, the TPC Louisiana golf course is as unique as the celebrated city itself. Legendary architect **Pete Dye** designed the golf course with the collaboration of fellow PGA TOUR players Steve Elkington and New Orleans native Kelly Gibson. This Louisiana golf course is the perfect complement to the local ambiance.

The golf course features a challenging landscape of lush wetlands and native cypress trees that lie just across the great Mississippi River. TPC Louisiana is part of the Audubon Golf Trail and a proud member of the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary program.

TPC Louisiana is home to the state's only PGA TOUR event, the Zurich Classic of New Orleans. A stadium design brings golf fans up close to the action at every hole, making for a superb spectator experience. And five sets of tees on each hole ensure a rewarding round of golf for every player – no matter his or her handicap.

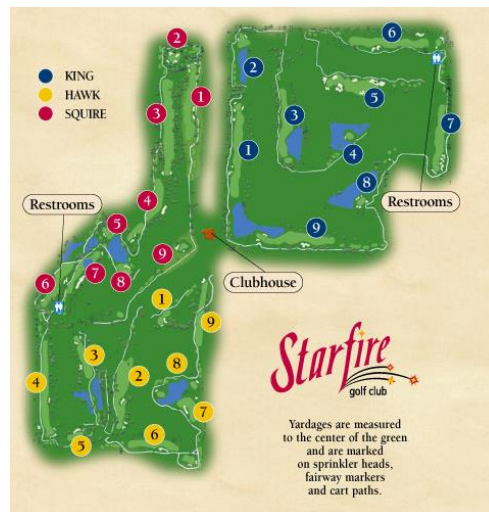
This championship golf course, located just outside of New Orleans in Avondale, is open to the public. TPC Louisiana, which opened in 2004, was honored by Golf Digest magazine that year as the fourth-ranked best upscale public golf course. TPC Louisiana is a repeat honoree in GolfWeek magazine's list of "Best Courses You Can Play" (Golf Digest 2011 Top 100 Public Golf Course).





The Starfire Golf Course (formerly Scottsdale Country Club) is a public golf course designed by **Arnold Palmer** located in the heart of Scottsdale, AZ. Starfire is a daily fee public golf course that provides an exceptional golf experience at an affordable price. The 27 holes situated in 3 different 9 hole layouts (King, Hawk and Squire) feature numerous water hazards and a desert backdrop. The three layouts are known mostly for their strong and beautiful par threes, many of which demand carries over water hazards. Numbers 2, 4 and 8 on the King and holes 8 and 9 on the Squire are particularly interesting.

Starfire is a lovely neighborhood golf club, which day in and day out, can be much more appealing than the high-end North Scottsdale knock-your-socks-off golf courses. Starfire, which is managed by In Celebration of Golf, began simply as Scottsdale Country Club, an 18-hole layout in 1953, making it Scottsdale's first course. Palmer was hired to design a new nine-hole layout, dubbed the "King" in 1988 and also re-designed the previous nines, which are named "Hawk" and "Squire." Since then, some holes have been rearranged, giving them a better flow and allowing them to work within the available space and with a new clubhouse constructed in 2001 that was placed about 500 yards from the original clubhouse site.







Designed by **Stephen Kay** and built in and around an old sand quarry, Scotland Run offers a distinctive blend of wooded, quarry, and links-style holes. The most unique characteristics include expansive waste areas and an imposing display of cliffs.

Located 20 minutes from downtown Philadelphia and 45 minutes from Atlantic City, Scotland Run is open to the public year-round for daily-fee play. A Golf Digest 4 1/2-Star winner, Scotland Run was named one of the Top 50 Public Courses in the country by the readers of Golf World in their annual Readers' Choice Awards in 2009 and 2010. The course also has the honor of being awarded the #1 course in the Philadelphia Region by Business Week Magazine.

Conceived in the late 90s and over ten years in the planning and execution, the Pound Ridge Golf Club has taken its place in the pantheon of great metropolitan golf courses. The signature wit of **Pete Dye's** designs, his enduring challenge for golfers to bring their best game and his sometimes maddening, more often inspiring, mathematical genius make Pound Ridge one of his most memorable courses. In his own words, "If you create in the mind of a golfer that he can remember some of the holes, that's extraordinary. And then, if you make it look, and it will look, very demanding, if it's still playable you've hit a home run."

Crafted by Dye, his son Perry and long-time Dye construction manager/lead shaper Michael Langkau, Pound Ridge Golf Club is a unique and thoroughly modern design in an area

previously known for its traditional golf courses. A full bentgrass facility, it is hewn from 172 acres of magnificent cliffs, streams and wooded hills in Westchester County. Dramatic rock formations have been left onsite, creating one of the most visually stunning settings for golf in the U.S. with more than 14,000-linear-feet of rock wall surrounding trees, wetlands and water hazards.

Contoured fairways winding through hardwood forests and fescue mounds lead to open meadows with picturesque green complexes. The property features some of the highest points in the region, offering expansive vistas of the surrounding countryside.
