


Walk in the Footsteps of Legends

Inverrary Country Club has two outstanding Robert Trent Jones, Sr. golf courses where the history and tradition of 15 PGA and LPGA tournaments live on! The famous signature East Course is where champions like Jack Nicklaus, Johnny Miller, Lee Trevino, Tom Kite, Hale Irwin and Tom Weiskopf have walked and won!

The West Course has also been host to numerous professional and amateur events (USGA Amateur Qualifiers, PGA South Florida Section Events, etc.). The course is more "target" golf than the East course culminating in the strong finishing hole. The 537-yard 18th hole is absolutely outstanding! A par 5 with a sharp dogleg to the left, the main challenge is avoid the bunkers at the corner of the dogleg. If you do, you have a chance to reach the green in two, where a birdie or eagle putt awaits you.

When you walk off the 18th green, you will feel the satisfaction of having played one of the best courses you will ever see. Our West Course is one that should be on your 'must play' list. We can assure you that it will be an unforgettable experience!

































The par-71, 6,700-yard course is set amid canyons and wetlands, the 18-hole course offers picturesque vistas across the 35-acre reservoir, large rolling greens surrounded by wildlife and natural vegetation and scenic hills studded with granite boulders and natural waterfalls. Developed by **Doug DeCinces**, former California Angel third baseman, Strawberry Farms Golf Club is sure to provide golfers with the finest golf experience in Orange County.







STREAMSONG BLACK

The newest course at the Streamsong Resort, Black is designed by **Gil Hanse** and **Jim Wagner**, the same team that's been setting the contemporary golf universe on edge with such stirring, retro-styled layouts as The Rio 2016 Olympic Course and Castle Stuart in Scotland.

Given much more room than the other courses at Streamsong, Streamsong Black's golf envelope is 300 acres, more than double an average layout and enough room for 86 acres of fairways and tees, 11 acres of tightly mown greens surrounds, a six-hole practice course and the resort's first quality range. It's two miles end to end on Streamsong Black, the entire length of it visible from either end of the site. The expansive vistas and large greens differentiate the course from the Red & Blue.






esigned by **William Bell, Sr.** in 1957 and renovated in 2016 by **Tom Weiskopf**, the Torrey Pines North course (along with its more famous sister South course) is home of the Farmers Insurance Invitational PGA Golf Tournament played in the end of January. Both 18-hole courses (North and South) are very scenic with beautiful ocean views. However, Weiskopf, with his renovation, or redesign, as he preferred to call it, set out to change the North Course perception as an afterthought.

"I think everybody is going to enjoy this golf course," he said, "It's playable. It's maintainable. It's memorable. This is such a special piece of property."

The sum of his work is that the North Course need not be an afterthought. It's now more of a viable and more pleasurable alternative to the South, or a reason for visitors from out of town to schedule 36 holes instead of 18.











































PGA Tour architect and legend Bobby Weed designed the 18-hole Spanish Oaks golf course with two goals in mind: to create one of the best golfing experiences in Texas and, while doing so, to revere, restore and sustain the natural environment of the site. Weed's layout brings

the existing topography into play on every hole, requiring shots up and down slopes, over ravines, creeks and ponds. His greens challenge the putter's eye and mind. Thanks to an abundant supply of reclaimed irrigation water, the course remains lushly green even in the driest periods.



















Olde Sycamore Golf Plantation is nestled among a mature forest of hardwoods only a few minutes from I-485. This semi-private course opened in May of 1997 and was recognized as the "Best New Course" and "Best Eastside Course" in the Queen City by Charlotte's Best Magazine.

Carolina's noted Hall of Fame architect **Tom Jackson**, who has built many high-profile courses in the Carolinas, routed Olde Sycamore through majestic Carolina tall pines... ideal for golf. Fairways are hybrid Bermuda and the undulating bent grass greens are among the best in the Charlotte region. A nice touch at Olde Sycamore is the use of zoysia grass around the bunkers, allowing for greater definition around each green. Such a combination creates the best condition and challenges of a premiere course.



















The Governors Club is a Nashville gated community in one of the most prestigious areas in the Southeastern United States and home to country music celebrities, professional sports stars, and industry captains alike. The centerpiece of the community is a private 18-hole **Arnold Palmer** Signature course highlighted by magnificent stone and rock work. Each demanding hole grabs your attention with natural flowing creeks, waterfalls and panoramic views of the Tennessee foothills.

This Tennessee master-planned community rests on 618 acres of prime Nashville real estate and is a shining example of Old South architecture, well-planned green spaces, and upscale amenities. Just fifteen minutes from downtown Nashville, the Governors Club offers terrific views and challenging play for golfers at every skill level. Well-groomed fairways and greens keep the Governors Club difficult yet friendly, and the hilly terrain ensures you never have an even lie.





Situated deep in the rolling terrain of central Pennsylvania, another world of exhilarating golf awaits! A place where carefully designed courses harmonize with the natural beauty of the surroundings. The Penn State Golf Courses offer golfers the very best the game has to offer–from the trip up its tree-lined drive to finest in course facilities and personalized service to the relaxing atmosphere in the Walker Clubhouse.

The **Blue Course** was originally designed in 1960 by Penn State alumni **Ferdinand Garban** and **James Harrison** and finished renovations in 2006. Three ponds were added, and the course lengthened over 640 yards. The front nine, par 36, measures 3696 yards off the New Nittany tees. Its layout is quite different than you will find on the back nine. Tee shots require close attention to placement. A rewarding tee shot puts you in position to try your luck at carefully guarded greens. Twenty-seven strategically placed green side bunkers on the front nine will challenge your course management skills, and patience. The front nine provides a challenge to the most experienced player by demanding not only in length but accuracy.

The back nine, par 36, is a newly constructed nine holes completed in 1994 and new additions in 2006. It measures 3518 yards off the New Nittany tees and provides a quite different experience than the front nine. The back nine not only includes 16 green side bunkers but adds to the challenge by including 11 strategically placed fairway bunkers. Water hazards on the 14th and the 18th can add pressure to a seemingly easy tee shot. The back nine provides large undulating greens and a links style atmosphere.
























Engulfed by the pristine beauty of Georgia nature, Stone Mountain Golf Club has become one of the premier golf experiences in the Atlanta area. Located just 30 minutes from downtown, the club sits in the shadows of the Stone Mountain Memorial, and meanders around Stone Mountain Lake.

What makes Stone Mountain Golf Club such a remarkable experience is the unique personalities of its two courses. The

Stonemont Course is a classic challenge that places emphasis on accuracy and strategic course management.

Designed and built in 1969 by the renowned **Robert Trent Jones Sr.**, this masterpiece has offered a pure test of golf from all tees since its inception. The Stonemont Course at Stone Mountain Golf Club has played host to numerous national, professional events as well as Georgia amateur championships.

The Stonemont Course is laid out over gently rolling and cantered fairways of premier Bermuda grass and greens of immaculate bent grass.

The par 70 layout stretches 6,863 yards, and is challenging with its narrow fairways, strategically placed bunkers and numerous stands of Georgia pines.













Opened in 2005 by famed golf course architect **Greg Norman**, River Club merges his appreciation of the native landscape with his strategic design skills to create what many are calling the very definition of a true world-class golf course!


The River Club's Signature Hole is the 163 Yard Hole #17, which plays from an elevated tee, just behind the clubhouse, to a beautiful island green. River Club has garnered many accolades in its short history and has been the host site to 3 US Open Qualifying Competitions. In 2019, River Club has the honor of hosting the GSGA Mid-Amateur Championship!

As you play the golf course, you will experience two completely different nines. The Front Nine was masterfully designed with the natural terrain and winds through century old hardwoods and residential community. The player will experience a sense of peacefulness with no parallel fairways. The Back Nine offers an enchanting "Park-Like" setting along the Chattahoochee River Plain with vibrant wetlands.























Conestoga Country Club is a true member's club. Fifty or so original members paid **William Gordon**, \$5,000 to design the layout, then did almost all the construction themselves. They had only two paid employees - a supervisor and a part-time bulldozer operator.

The majority of the members gave up golf for the entire summer of 1947 to build their new course. Few workers bothered to record their hours, but the estimated number is close to 20,000.

The area east of the Conestoga Creek was heavily wooded, and about 2,000 trees were removed to make room for the course. The area east of the creek was farmland, and about 600 trees were planted to the separate the fairways.

By the end of 15 months the job was relatively complete. The

members/workers had constructed 18 greens and fairways and laid 8,000 feet of irrigation pipe. A 25-horsepower motor pumped water from the creek to all the greens at the same time

The first rounds at Conestoga were played June 20, 1948, after a speech by club president Ollie Frey. Clair Alexander, the club's past president, hit the initial drive. Sixty-six players turned in cards the first day, with Mickey Draude recording the low score with a gross 74 and net 74.

At the time, the course was called Overlook Country Club because the original members were friends who had played their golf at Overlook Golf Club and had planned to buy that course.

The name of their new club was officially changed to Conestoga Country Club on Nov. 8, 1948.



















The original Meadow Creek and Dogwood courses, designed by the acclaimed William S. Flynn, at Lancaster Country Club require a balance of long and short hole skills as well as strategic play and rewards accuracy as well as creativity. Lancaster Country Club presents a strategic challenge to the skilled professional yet remains playable for the average golfer.

Along with the likes of A.W. Tillinghast and Donald Ross, Flynn is considered to be one of the most significant and influential designers of the "Golden Age" of golf course architecture.

Recently, the club completed a course restoration project working with Flynn specialists Ron Forse and Jim Nagle. Their task was to improve course infrastructure while enhancing playability and the strategic elements of the course. Maintaining the integrity of Flynn's design was of paramount importance and Forse and Nagle were able to meet this objective and successfully re-integrated Flynn elements that had been lost over time.







Memorable Golf in a Superb Natural Setting

Designed by two-time U.S. Open Champion Andy North and Roger Packard, Eagle Brook Country Club's remarkable 254-acre links-style championship layout was artfully designed to blend seamlessly with its pristine natural surroundings just 45 minutes from Chicago. Large stands of mature trees frame gently rolling fairways and immaculate emerald greens, with 92 acres of preserved wetlands adding to the course's strategic diversity as well as its breathtaking beauty.

The 18-hole course features 6,736 yards of golf from the longest tees for a par of 72. The course rating is 72.6 and it has a slope rating of 134 on Bent grass.

The course sits in low a wetland so even on seemingly dry days, there is not much roll making the course play very long.





culpted from stunning verdant terrain in the shadows of the Cascade Mountains by iconic golfer and golf course designer Jack
Nicklaus, The Club at Snoqualmie Ridge's par72, 7,264-yard championship layout adds yet another chapter to the storied legacy of the Golden Bear - renowned for creating some of the most extraordinary golf layouts in the world.

Dense stands of towering firs frame wide emerald green fairways and manicured greens, with picturesque water features and panoramic mountain views around every turn creating both strategic diversity and a breathtaking backdrop for golf.



While challenging for professional golfers who annually compete in the PGA TOUR Champions' Boeing Classic, the course features multiple tees on each hole, enabling golfers of all abilities an opportunity to enjoy Washington's only Jack Nicklaus Signature Design Course. Adding to the allure, golfers share the course with an array of indigenous wildlife species – with an eagle sanctuary located on the 14th hole.

Eight-time PGA TOUR Champions winner Kenny Perry calls The Club at Snoqualmie Ridge "...one of my favorite places to play in the world. I love the golf course. It's a big golf course. I think it favors a power hitter."









































Stone Creek Golf Club, in Oregon City, OR, is a young, modern course, yet authentically Northwest. Portland's own **Peter Jacobson** contributed to Stone Creek's design, so it's no surprise that the course highlights the beauty of its surroundings, maintains the integrity of its natural setting, and can withstand considerable rainfall. With an excellent drainage system, this is one of the area's best winter tracks. In addition to its impeccable condition, the diverse array of course characteristics is a standout quality. Stone Creek provides a new test at every turn. There are beautiful, luxury homes bordering the south and west side, but the rest of the course is surrounded only by nature. Near the clubhouse, you can see Mt. Hood peering over the trees to the east. And true to its name, there are large stone boulders aesthetically plotted throughout several holes; an unofficial signature for this detailed track.

BROADMOOR











The Broadmoor Golf Club is home to some of the most celebrated golf courses in the United States. Designed by legends including **Donald Ross** and **Robert Trent Jones, Sr.,** these award-winning courses have hosted countless tournaments and challenged and delighted players of all skill levels.

The Broadmoor's East Course is known for its wide, tree-lined fairways and expansive greens. With its challenging terrain and amazing mountain vistas, The East Course is ranked among the best golf courses in the country. Since the large trees can alter your shots and the putting greens difficult to read, the best tip we can offer for those taking on this open course is to remember that putts break away from the mountains.

With holes designed by both Trent Jones and Ross, the East Course has been home to many major tournaments, including the 1959 U.S. Amateur (which was Jack Nicklaus' first major win), the 1967 U.S. Amateur, and the 1995 U.S. Women's Open, which was Annika Sorenstam's first major title. Most recently, the famous course served as the host to the 2008 U.S. Senior Open, 2011 U.S. Women's Open Championship and the 2018 U.S. Senior Open. In 2025, The Broadmoor is proud to host the U.S. Senior Open once more.




















Seaview Golf & Country Club is an 18-hole course in North Sydney on Cape Breton Island with a course rating of 71.3 and a 131 slope. The par-71 course (6,146 yards) boasts rolling hills and spectacular views of the North West Arm and Sydney. Designed by Robert Moote, it is also a challenging course with water hazards and bunkers in play on many of the holes. Today Seaview ranks as one of the nicest courses in the province, with exceptional elevations and great views of the surrounding countryside. Although many of the initial holes are open, accurate tee shots are required for most of the course. Visiting tourists regularly hail Seaview's scenic beauty and challenging layout as a testament to the "Ancient Game".











In 1939, when the National Park Service hired Stanley Thompson to design and build what he later called "the mountains and ocean" course, he told friends that it was the best contract he ever had. He was given one of the country's most scenic and awe-inspiring national parks and had just one mandate: take advantage of it. The result is an inspired piece of architecture that has proved to be one of Thompson's finest design achievements.

Many have referred to Cape Breton Highlands as Thompson's homage to golf's Scottish roots and St. Andrews in particular. In 2002, Sports Illustrated gathered a panel of golf historians and experts to rank the schools of golf course design in order of influence. Stanley Thompson's ranked fifth. And the most influential course to arise from that school, according to the panel? His "mountains and ocean" course, Cape Breton Highlands.

























































Never is the game of golf more appealing than when a course is set in a rugged, oceanfront landscape, on links land running firm and fast. This is Cabot Links, where the holes spread out between the sea and the village of Inverness.

This is Cabot Links—as designed by gifted Canadian golf course architect, **Rod Whitman**—where every hole offers an ocean view and where five holes play directly adjacent to the beach. This is the first authentic links in Canada, and one of the world's greatest courses. This is Cabot Links.

Cabot occupies the site of a former coal mine along the shores of Cape Breton Island. Every hole boasts water views, either of the Gulf of St. Lawrence or MacIsaac's Pond, the tidal inlet that shelters a picturesque working harbor beyond the sixth green. From the first hole it's clear Whitman was blessed with a distinct advantage on this project before he even picked up a pencil—a plot of land that mimics those of some of the greatest links courses in Great Britain and Ireland — a strip of sand-based turf that runs from the water up towards the small town of Inverness, Nova Scotia, and contains enough humps, hillocks, and hollows to make a hobbit feel at home. The site is roughly rectangular, with a long edge running along the coast that offers enough land for a variety of stunning seaside golf holes.



































Exquisitely carved out of the breathtaking Cape Breton landscape, with postcard-worthy panoramas vying for your attention and rich, rolling fairways waiting to reward your creativity, this is links land golf at its best. Lose yourself in a place that is off the beaten path and far from the expected.

Cabot Cliffs is built by dreamers, for dreamers, as it's designed by legendary course designers **Bill Coore** and **Ben Crenshaw**. The most beautiful game on Earth, set against a backdrop only Mother Nature can provide. This is Cabot Cliffs.

Ron Whitten, architect for the sister property, in his piece for Golf Digest crowning Cabot Cliffs as the best new course of 2015, described it as no less than "the second coming of Cypress Point." In the same piece, architect Bill Coore gushed that the property had "more variety in terms of its natural holes, without doing anything to them, than any site we've had." The stretch from holes 4-6 runs along a tidal wash and then hard by the beach evoking the British Isles. The back-to-back par-5 7th and 8th, slashes into and then out of a rolling pine forest, looks like they're cut straight from a Rocky Mountain travel brochure. And the drop-shot par-3 9th, backdropped by the pulsing surf of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, would not be out of place on the Monterey Peninsula. And that's just the front 9. The entire course leaves you breathless – and why it's Canada's top-ranked course.





No two putting surfaces or contours are similar. Through the placement of four sets of tees, the course can be an entertaining 6,340-yard "Member Track" (5,121 yards for women members) or stretched to a demanding 7,440 yards in which the sleeping giant is awakened and all 76 bunkers figure prominently in the par 72 journey. The thrill of a well-struck shot is rewarded. The poorly-played shot is costly. That's how golf was designed to be played and how **Bruce Devlin** and **Robert von Hagge** designed the Nashville Golf & Athletic Club. But, in either case, replaying the round is enhanced by the time-honored environment of the game enhanced by the clubhouse surroundings in the tradition of the 'Honorable Company of Edinburgh Golfers'. The mood here is absolutely golf.





In 1901, Rutland Country Club moved from its original location and was established as a corporation under the laws of the State of Vermont, and Articles of Association were filed with the Secretary of State as well as the Rutland City Clerk. In 1902 a group of members, led by John Woodfin, Club President, and James Button, Club Treasurer, purchased a 382acre farm from John Baxter for \$4648. That farm became the Rutland Country Club. Architect George Low designed the original ninehole layout, completing his work in 1902. In 1927 the famed architectural firm of Stiles & Van Kleek supervised the construction of an additional nine holes, resulting in the venerable golf course we enjoy today. The Baxter farmhouse (Circa 1800) was used as the Clubhouse. A store was operated by the general manager and was stocked with sundries, clothes, food, as well as golf equipment. Products from the farm including milk, hay and apples were also sold as part of the Club operation. In addition, member's horses were stabled, groomed and pastured on the property. Some of the buildings are still being used as the maintenance facility and our famous "Caddy Shack". The original Clubhouse was in continuous operation until it was razed in 1988 to make way for the facility you are enjoying today. Over 100 years later, we continue to enjoy a unique golfing experience on a course rich in challenge and tradition. We invite you to share in this experience and have a wonderful day.

























Falsterbo Golfclub was founded in 1909 and moved to its current location around the lighthouse in 1911. Later the same year the first 9 holes were constructed. Players shared the course with horses, cows, and geese.

Professional Robert Turnbull from Copenhagen Golfclub was hired to design the course. He had no experience as a course designer but had a sense for what a course should look like.

Turnbull understood the essentials about differences in altitude and managed to use them when designing the greens.

The full 18 holes course was consecrated the summer of 1930. After a few changes, the course was finished in its current layout 1934. Doctor **Gunnar Bauer** was responsible for the design of the 18-hole course. He did a magnificent job and formed the course

after the natural changes in the landscape. Bauer also designed the course with wind in mind, well aware that it could quickly change the characteristics of the different holes. Falsterbo golf course is located in a beautiful nature reserve called Flommen which is internationally famous for its migratory of birds. Many ornithologists travel far to experience Falsterbo's unique bird life.





















Born from the vision of Jim Kemper Jr. and the design of architects **Ken Killian** and **Dick Nugent**, Kemper Lakes Golf Club exudes a classic golf ambiance that is steeped in tradition. Opened in 1979, the course features a dramatic, sprawling layout filled with expansive lakes, meandering fairways, pristine meadowlands and historic stands of oak. Kemper has hosted several tournaments and was once a regular stop on the PGA Tour along with hosting the 1989 PGA Championship. A three-year bunker renovation by Rick Jacobson has allowed the course to retain the feel of days gone by, while offering new challenges which are sure to test golfers of all skill levels.

















The Golf Club of Tennessee opened for member play in 1991. Tom Fazio, widely acclaimed as one of today's best golf course architects, fashioned a golfing masterpiece on 317 acres of Tennessee's most beautiful rolling land, in a wonderfully quiet and pastoral setting. Featuring zoysia fairways, Bermuda roughs, and A1 bent grass greens, the 7,184-yard, par-71 course sprawls over nearly twice the acreage of a traditional 18-hole course. Fazio used all of the elements of design excellence—with holes that are strategic and penal, challenging yet player-friendly, and memorable but not contrived. The course's natural beauty and topographic features are carefully interwoven to create an exciting golf course.

















Gaylord Springs, designed by US
Open and PGA champion Larry
Nelson, offers challenges for golfers
of any skill level. The links-style
course demands accuracy to stay clear
of the deep bunkers, water hazards and
rolling grass mounds but also requires
creativity and a soft touch around the
undulating, MiniVerde Bermuda grass greens.
Carved from the banks of the meandering
Cumberland River and bordered by limestone bluffs
and wetlands, Gaylord Springs Golf Links will test and
enthuse you from the moment you tee off until you pull your
ball from the cup.







Minimalist in its Devereux Emmet design (you can still see the faint traces of old roadbeds over which the course was routed) and natural in its upkeep, Garden City G.C. is one of the great early tournament venues in the U.S. Before the 1908 U.S. Amateur, Walter Travis remodeled the course into what it is today, its

strategies dictated by many deep pot bunkers. Travis installed them to promote "thinking golf," but one player soon dubbed Garden City the home of the "God-fearing approach shot." It's also a rare 100 Greatest course with a closing par 3.



















































With countless palms spotting this special property, Trump National Doral - Golden Palm in Miami, Florida, is perhaps the most beautiful 18-hole track in South Florida. Originally designed by **Robert von Hagge** and recently redesigned by Gil Hanse, Golden Palm is a links-style course featuring unique bunkers surrounded by thick rough and severely contoured greens. Players face water on every hole at Golden Palm with the

pinnacle of the round coming on the exciting island green on the 18th hole. An engaging layout combined with ideal playing conditions and beautiful <u>scenery</u>, Golden Palm provides golfers with the perfect mix to make a great day on the course. And for players that want to keep their round going after 18 holes, Trump National Doral has three more spectacular courses to choose from: Blue Monster, Red Tiger and Silver Fox.
