



# The Cinnamon Hill Golf Course at Rose Hall

At Cinnamon Hill, course designers **von Hagge** and **Baril** redesigned **Hank Smedley's** original 1969 design but kept the elevations that give the sense of both links and inland golf. These combine to offer the best of Jamaica golf — the cool ocean spray on your cheeks as you putt on seaside greens, then the wind whistling through the pines as you tee-off on the 17th hole, 350 feet above sea level. This is an enjoyable test of golf with enchanting panoramas framing your every shot.

Part of the unique Cinnamon Hill experience are the caddies. They are listed among "The Best In The World" by *Golfer* magazine and they are equally happy to discuss Annee Palmer or Arnold Palmer and can read greens better than any pro.
























Situated on the historic 4,000 acre Rose Hall Plantation, and sited on 200 acres of lush greenery and rolling countryside, The White Witch Golf Course is carved from the rolling countryside of Jamaica's historic Rose Hall Plantation and is an 18-hole championship golf course designed by **Robert von Hagge** and **Rick Baril**. This 6,758-yard, Par 71 treasure, staffed by the Ladies & Gentlemen of the Ritz-Carlton Golf & Spa Resort, Rose Hall, Jamaica is named for the plantation's beautiful but wicked 19th century plantation mistress, Annee Palmer.

Legend has it that Annee's ghost still haunts the estate, creating an alluring mystique that has fascinated island natives and visitors for generations. Rated as the #1 Golf Course and #1 in Golf Shop Staff service by Conde Nast Traveler, the White Witch is considered one of the finest golf courses in the Caribbean, characterized by mountainous terrain, cool trade winds, colorful foliage and spectacular ocean views from 16 of its 18 holes.





#### CHARLOTTE COUNTRY CLUB



Charlotte Country Club has a long and storied history. Originally designed by **Donald Ross** in 1906 on a large rolling piece of property with gradual elevation changes that are so very useful in golf course design the course was later revised and enlarged by Mr. Ross in the 1920's.

Charlotte Country Club was the site for many a North Carolina Open and Amateur as well as a number of events of the Carolinas Golf Association. It was very highly regarded by both local and national golfers. In the 1960's the Club hired Robert Trent Jones to reroute the last three holes of the course to accommodate an expansion of the Clubhouse. Jones also redesigned a number of the holes on the course and changed both the bunkering scheme and some of the green surfaces.

In the early 1970's Charlotte Country Club was the site for the US Amateur. Though the course acquitted itself well, the competition in North Carolina began to heat up. Many new courses were built in the 1980's and 90's that were bigger and more challenging. Charlotte CC searched for an answer to regaining its former glory. A redesign in 1996 did not accomplish the goal so in 2005 a group of members led by Doug Buchanan began a program to restore the golf course to the original Ross flavor and feel.

The club brought in Ron Prichard who returned sand traps to their original Ross scheme and removed hundreds of trees. The result is a new big, brawny and beautiful course at the Charlotte Country Club. It is a great tribute to its original creator, Donald Ross.



















**Solution** tone Tree Golf Club, located in scenic Marin County, features a public 18-hole championship golf course situated amongst oak forests and pristine wetlands. The course design highlights a bounty of natural beauty with magnificent views of Mt. Tamalpais, Mt. Burdell and the Coastal Range. Stone Tree offers virtually unlimited challenges and rewards from tee to green. The design is the result of an inspired collaboration between venerable golfing figure and storied design expert **Sandy Tatum**, World Golf Hall-of-Famer **Johnny Miller**, design craftsmen **Jim Summers** and **Fred Bliss**.







































If you're going to play 'the track' at Delaware Park, most people would probably believe you're heading off to lay down some bets on the ponies.

But thanks to some forward looking people at the famous racetrack, you're just as likely these days (at least when it isn't racing season) to mean you're going to play some golf. White Clay Creek Country Club opened in late June of 2005, and ever since, has given Delaware Park a double meaning for 'track.'


White Clay Creek isn't for those who can't hit it straight – part of the tight nature of the course is due to the land it's on, and who better to explain why it was tricky to put a golf course there than its architects, **Arthur Hills** and **Steve Forrest**: "By far, the most difficult thing about the White Clay Creek project was building a golf course in a floodplain. From the permitting process to actually dealing with floodwaters from hurricanes and tropical storms, the floodplain issues made everything else seem easy."

The most prevalent feature of the course is White Clay Creek itself, which you never quite seem to get away from – that's the nature of the land, but sixteen of the eighteen holes contains a water hazard (hence, the absolute need to hit it straight).

That environmental sensitivity and stewardship has lent itself to creating an atmosphere that's pretty rare for a golf course that's essentially located in a busy metropolitan area. A couple of the holes run close to roads, but overall, there are several corners of the golf course where it's just you and nature.

And because the property is so vast, nearly every hole is self-contained. "There are only a few areas where there are overlaps in traffic from different holes," Forrest explained. "Even when the golf course is full to capacity, you still feel as if you're the only one on the course."






Sherwood Country Club is a private golf, tennis and country club set at the base of the majestic Santa Monica Mountains in Thousand Oaks, CA. The Club is home to the championship 18hole Jack Nicklaus signature golf course which proudly hosts the Tiger Woods Foundation World Challenge Tournament. The Sherwood Country Club is nothing short of a spectacular course and experience. From the time you are greeted by the staff in front of the 54,000 square foot clubhouse to the moment you walk off of Nicklaus' finest finishing hole ever, your experience at Sherwood is complete first class. Sherwood Country Club is a comfortable walk where you can request either a forecaddie or enjoy the full experience of having a clubcarrying caddy accompany you for the round. While at the course you can count on enjoying immaculate conditioning and fast greens, stunning water features, and wonderfully designed holes.

Like Augusta National, Sherwood has its own version of Amen Corner and the 459 yard 13th is the final hole in that difficult stretch. Water runs the entire length of the hole down the right side while OB stakes line the left side of the hole putting a premium on the accuracy of the tee shot. A group of sycamore trees surround the green along with a bunker that runs the right side of the putting surface and wraps around the back. Once on the green it doesn't get any easier since three putts seem to happen on this hole more often than any other at Sherwood.

Sherwood got its name thanks to the filming of Robin Hood at the location in the 50's where the area starred as the Sherwood Forest. The site may also be familiar for M\*A\*S\*H\* fans for the familiar mountain backdrops.



## HIDDEN CREEK



Hidden Creek Golf Club, rated #72 by Golf Magazine's "Top 100 Courses in the U.S." and #71 by Golf Week Magazine's "Top 100 Modern courses in the U.S." is nestled amidst a background of natural pine,

maple, and oak trees in Egg Harbor Township, New Jersey. Hidden Creek is an exclusive for-members-only golf club designed and built to international standards by world-renowned golf course architects **Bill Coore** and **Ben Crenshaw**. Sculpted out of 750 acres of magnificent aged woodlands and adorned with rolling hills, meandering streams, and wildlife, this course is truly a sanctuary.

The course blends the unique architectural style of Coore and Crenshaw with the inherent characteristics of the land upon which the course is built to provide a challenge commensurate with each player's skill level. In the tradition of golf's old world style, members play when they wish on this 18-hole healthland style golf course. Opened in May of 2002, the course offers an enjoyable and playable experience — with one of the friendliest staff you will find at any private course. Anywhere. The champion tees measure 7023 yards, the member tees 6562 yards, the club tees 6155 and the forward tees 5447 yards. Every hole is distinct, visually striking and uniquely appealing.





























Carved out of the rugged coast, the Challenge at Manele sprawls across ancient lava fields, with 180-degree ocean panoramas from every hole. A theater of color unfolds: red cliffs plunging down to blue sea, green

fairways engulfing white sand traps, and blossoms from fissures in the black lava rock. This was the palette of designer **Jack Nicklaus**, who shaped the 7,039–yard, par 72 championship course, carefully protecting and preserving the archaeological ruins within its borders.

Teeing off from the cliffs at Hulopoe Bay with the Pacific surging below, you face perhaps the world's most unforgiving water hazard. The twelfth hole is nothing short of a leap of faith, with 200 yards of churning waves to cross. Other holes demand shots over yawning ravines, to sloping fairways, and with spectacular views to distract you at every turn. Fortunately, the five-tee concept - with courses of shorter yardage mapped in red, white, blue, gold and "Nicklaus" - allows golfers of all levels to emerge unscathed.





























The sensation of striking a dew-kissed drive into the morning Kapalua sun is, to the avid golfer, golf at its finest. Recognized as one of the top golf resorts in the world, Kapalua's two championship golf courses are nothing short of breathtaking.

#### The Plantation Course


Built around the natural wonders of the West Maui Mountains, the Plantation Course at Kapalua ranks among the world's greatest courses. So special, even the PGA TOUR only allows winners from the previous year to tee it up at its season opening event, the Hyundai Tournament of Champions. Witness aweinspiring views, dramatic elevation changes, and nature's challenges, as you test your ability and experience golf at its finest. Experience the opportunity to play the same par 73, 7,411-yard course as many of golf's greats. The Plantation Course was

designed by famed golf architects **Ben Crenshaw** and **Bill Coore**.

#### The Bay Course

Host of the 2008 Kapalua LPGA Classic, the Bay Course winds its way through towering palms and flowering hibiscus. All your worries will vanish with the trade winds as your 5th tee shot carries glistening Oneloa Bay. With its uninterrupted views of the Pacific and gentle rolling fairways, the Bay Course is sure to excite both amateur and avid golfers alike.

The forerunner of the resort's two championship courses, the par 72, 6,600-yard Bay Course was formerly host to the Lincoln-Mercury Kapalua International. The **Arnold Palmer** and **Francis Duane** designed course was one of the earliest features in the development of Kapalua Resort.









































n 1880, the Preston family of England constructed a three-story resort in South Heidelberg Township. On April 8, 1911, the Preston's sold the resort to the Galen Hall Company, which ran a hotel and health sanatorium of the same name in Atlantic City, N.J. In 1912, the Galen Hall Company built a Mountain wing onto the resort, which now offered seven stories and 300 rooms. Galen Hall had to compete with Walter's Park and Grand View, and the owners had to add something that none of the others could offer.

So, Scottish emigrant Alex Findlay (1865-1942) designed the original nine-hole golf course. Findlay was a pioneer who helped bring the Scottish game to the attention of Americans, many of whom had never even heard of the game. The front nine was built in 1912. A. W. Tillinghast added his unmistakable touch to the

course, with the 15th hole, also known as the "Moat Hole." The course and hotel were a Mecca for celebrities during this era.



Galen Hall was well known for its beautiful and tricky golf course as well as for its conventions held in the spring and fall. The Galen Hall Hotel was sold in 1935 to an experienced New York hotel man, Emanuel Burack, who began taking the already elegant resort and transforming it into a more modern first class destination hotel. It was in this era that the Forest Glades Pool was built from a natural pond surrounded by tall hemlock trees.

The golf course was again enhanced in 1955 by the father and son team William & David Gordon, who designed other local courses such as Saucon Valley and Sunnybrook. The work made some refinements and lengthened the course to its current 6,271 yards, increasing par from 68 to 72.


Today, the Galen Hall Golf Club and an adjacent chalet-style restaurant are the only reminders of the famed resort -- the fun coming to a fiery halt on Palm Sunday 1963, when a blaze destroyed the hotel. The structure was leveled and never rebuilt. Over the years, the surviving property has changed hands several times and is a distant memory of the halcyon days of South Mountain.

#### The World's Original Island Green...the Moat Hole #15
























Incorporated in 1914, Sunnybrook was organized by six "crusaders" who defected from the Philadelphia Cricket Club in 1913 and founded the original club between Mill Road and Haws Lane, west of Church Road in Flourtown. The founders of the new club were determined to have a small, proprietary golf club. They did not want a crowded course and the other problems associated with a large membership and "country club atmosphere."

Donald Ross designed the original "old Sunnybrook" which possessed some excellent golf holes – the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup>, long par fours, parallel to each other, both crossing the stream for which the club was named; the beautiful 13<sup>th</sup> with the same stream wandering across the fairway and along the right edge up to the green, with lovely willow trees alongside; the par three 16<sup>th</sup> hole with its two-tiered, treacherous green.

In 1954, a combination of circumstances (not the least of which was the impending new Route 309 which obliterated the famous 5<sup>th</sup> green) caused the club to seek a new location.

A beautiful 135-acre site was found – the old William Disston farm, which was purchased in December 1954. The new course was designed by William Gordon and his son David.

A new modern clubhouse was opened February 15, 1956. The course was first played June 16, 1956. In August 1989 Sunnybrook acquired some additional peripheral acreage abutting the golf course in order to protect the integrity of the course. On September 30, 2001 an additional 33 acres of land was acquired extending the southern boundary of the Club. This acquisition was accomplished in cooperation with the Montgomery County Lands Trust and the Preservation Alliance of Philadelphia and provides a permanent open space conservation easement on the property.

Over the years, Sunnybrook has hosted the United States Golf Association Senior Men's Amateur Championship (1971) and the USGA Ladies Amateur Championship (1978) as well as a number of local and state tournaments. Sunnybrook's own annual Silver Putter Tournament is, of course, one of the area's most famous tournaments.

Acknowledged to be one of the hardest courses in the area, Sunnybrook continues to test the mettle of its members and to afford them the privileges of a small club.





































Grand Cypress Golf Club offers 45 holes of **Jack Nicklaus** Signature golf -- a truly diverse selection of Orlando golf. The 27-hole North/South/East Course provides the ultimate test of accuracy while the 18-hole New Course provides a Scottish links masterpiece.

The South and East Nines offer a variety of mental and physical stimuli that, unlike other Orlando golf courses, test accuracy rather than strength and distance. The original South Nine, marked by sharply ledged fairways, tall shaggy mounds and plateau greens perched above water or sand, is a demanding, target-style test. The sportier, more wooded East Nine is more generous, with less bunkering allowing for more run-up shots. The beautiful East 5 island hole will test the skill of all golfers, and if you come up short, you may find yourself in the water.

In 2007 and 2008, the original North/South Course was renovated and redesigned. Jack Nicklaus came back to Grand Cypress to change play on several of the holes. The end result is a longer course featuring course conditions that are even more grand than before and unique amongst Orlando golf courses.



When Golf Digest magazine named The Ridge at Back Brook the second best new private course east of The Mississippi and sixth best private track in America, it merely confirmed what the development team, architect and members had known all along.

"We knew we had a world-class golf course that was as good as any in the country and one that offered a golfing experience second to none. We weren't wrong," said developer and Princeton businessman Joel Moore of the **Tom Fazio**-designed course that plays 7,156 yards from the championship tees.

Golf Digest's recognition of The Ridge in its 21st annual lists of America's Best New Courses (January 2004 issue) comes on the heels of the New Jersey Golf Course Owners Association naming the golf only, par 72 layout the Best New Private Golf Course in New Jersey.

Touted by Moore as the course where "scores will mean something and the walk between shots will mean everything," The Ridge at Back Brook has been carefully integrated into a 300-acre pastoral setting on Wertsville Road in East Amwell Township. The site's natural features include Back Brook and a number of smaller tributaries, multiple ridges with unique rock wall faces, three ponds, numerous wetlands, significant elevation changes, dense stands of century-old specimen trees and clusters of colorful rock outcroppings.

Fazio took advantage of the natural topography at The Ridge and enhanced an already idyllic setting.

"Mother Nature gave us an ideal canvas with which to work," said Fazio. "We didn't have to create or manufacture holes like we so often have to do to meet the quality golfers expect. This property did that for us by allowing us to create spectacular backdrops and framing for each hole."

























Deerhurst Resort is the Muskoka golf resort that started it all. The resort is renowned for many reasons, but Deerhurst Highlands Golf Course is what separates it from others in the golfing world. Deerhurst sparked Muskoka's emergence as a major, must-play Canadian golf destination. Ranked as one of Canada's top 100 golf courses of 2012 by SCOREGolf, Deerhurst Highlands continues to remain one of the top golfing destinations in Muskoka.

Taking full advantage of the dramatic landscape while capitalizing on elevation changes, rugged granite outcroppings and dense forests, Cupp and McBroom

created a design that is a genuine representation of the region, while maintaining a highly playable, wellbalanced course that has stood the test of time.





















#### RATED 19TH IN TOP 100 MODERN GOLF COURSES

### PHILMONT COUNTRY CLUB

Philmont Country Club officially opened on May 18,1907, taking its name from the nearby train station. In those days many of the members who continued to reside in the city took the 9:17 train on Saturday morning from Reading Terminal, and went back home on the 12:19 a.m., following the Saturday evening festivities. For them, a day at the country club was a long day. A horse-drawn bus transported them to and from the Philmont station.

The course opened with only a fledgling 9-hole golf course. Among those first members, few had ever struck a golf ball. In fact, when the first greens committee was appointed, only two members could be found who had played golf. Tennis was the most popular sport then at Philmont. Baseball also

had plenty of enthusiasts. Even polo had its devotees. And the club's younger women organized a basketball team.

Despite the members' unfamiliarity with the Scottish game, golf caught on quickly and within a year of the club's opening, it had become so popular that a decision was made to lease additional land and build nine more holes. Scotland's Willie Park, Jr., architect of Berkshire's course, was brought in to lay out the new holes and substantially reorder the original nine. This charming eighteen would come to be called the South course, to distinguish it from the club's longer and more challenging second eighteen, the outstanding North course, laid out by William Flynn in 1924. Philmont remains a fixture in Philadelphia-area golf design.
























Bay Creek marks the first time Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer designed courses for the same club, and the golf legends did not disappoint. The two 18-hole Signature Courses combine the extraordinary views and natural features of the Eastern Shore and the Chesapeake Bay with historical landmarks from Cape Charles' 19th and early 20th century railroad days, all into one incredible state-of-the-art golf facility.

The more challenging of the courses, the Jack Nicklaus Signature Course is characterized by large waste bunkers and 100+ formal bunkers. With acres of dunes, mature trees, small well protected greens, and water on several holes, this shotmaker's design will challenge best. The course opened in 2006 and is currently ranked 8th best course in Virginia by Golfweek magazine.






















### Bel-Air Country Club

Once upon a time (circa 1920-22) there was an orange grove in Santa Fe Springs which sprung an oil leak that turned into a gusher that produced a golf course 29 miles away. This grew to become Bel-Air Country Club. Bel-Air was designed by **George Thomas** in 1925. Thomas designed the triumvirate of great courses in this area. Along with Bel-Air, he also designed L.A.C.C. and Riviera.

Over the course of nearly a century, Bel-Air has welcomed some of the most famous faces in show-biz. It has a history enriched with Hollywood tales and legends. It is said, however, that Bel-Air's greatest asset has always been the fellowship of its members.

Today Bel-Air Country Club is one of America's most

exclusive and premier clubs. It is an oasis in the

urban spread that is Los Angeles, snuggled within the residential community of Bel-Air.

Bel-Air has been the past host of the 1976 U.S. Amateur and the 2004 U.S. Senior Amateur. The Club has shown interest to the USGA to host a future Walker Cup.

It is of noteworthy significance that Bel-Air Country Club has been fortunate to have only had in its employ three golf professionals. For the first 80 years, Bel-Air was served by two outstanding professionals, Joe Novak and Eddie Merrins. Since 2003, David Podas has served as Director of Golf and Head Professional.
